Open Season on Antelope—

"I do," declared Harold Clifford, state game warden, "favor an open season on antelope in Oregon. They have been confined in an area until they have increased beyond expectations. There are some in the east who think there are only a few dozen antelope left in the world and they consider it a crime for any of the animals to be destroyed. In Lake, Harney and Malheur counties there are large bands of antelope that are a nuisance to the settlers. It is certain that some of these days an open season will be declared. Then there are a couple of bands of elk that are bothersome in Wallowa and Umatilla counties. They come down from the mountains and smash through the fences of ranchers, eating hay and getting into orchards and doing a lot of damage. There have long been complaints against the elk, but they are strictly protected. The farmers, however, do not feel kindly toward them. They cause more trouble than deer. We've had less trouble with deer this winter than a year ago when there were 50 straight days of sub-zero weather and we had to take hay out so the animals could have something to eat. No such condition has prevailed in the present winter, and the deer are coming through nicely. The elk, however, have been less considerate, for they have foraged to their hearts' content." Mr. Clifford returned to Portland yesterday from a trip to Coos bay—Oregonian.

Cold Nights, Warm Days—

According to word received from Medford, Crater Lake national park headquarters, days of sunshine and very cold nights have been the rule at Crater Lake, and last Friday night was so cold that the surface was frozen over, a rare occurrence, and the snow throughout the park was frozen into a solid ice mass. Bill Godfrey, chief ranger of the park has returned to Medford from an inspection trip through the park. The ice on the lake dissolved into mere ripples Saturday. This is the third time within the past ten years that ice has covered the surface of Crater Lake.
