

Arrangements Completed for Winter Sports

Entry Books for 42-Mile Event and Baldwin Hardware Company's Trail Breaker Will Remain Open Until Six O'clock Thursday Evening—Program and Prizes Announced.

PORT KLAMATH, Ore., Feb. 19 (Special)—All arrangements for Klamath's fourth annual winter sports carnival have been completed. Everything is in readiness to start the races and day's program promptly at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. Entry books for the 42-mile race and the Baldwin Hardware Company's Trail Breaker will remain open till six o'clock p. m. Feb. 20. Contestants in this event must report at Ski club headquarters Thursday night and be in readiness to make the trip to the Anna Springs Station Friday morning.

The public is cordially invited to participate in any of the minor contests and plenty of opportunity will be given prospective entrants to enter into these events just before they are staged.

Distance Retained
The distance will be retained in the major event this year and will be a full 42 miles. Starting just a few yards above the Anna Creek mill site the racers will follow the regular course to Crater Lake Lodge and return to starting place where they will turn back on the course once more and race again to a point near the 11-mile sign post about two miles above Klamath entrance. From this station they will make the final lap of the 42-mile race, finishing at the starting place. It was necessary to double up one end of the race in order to maintain the distance and this arrangement was decided on to give the spectators at the starting place the benefit of seeing the racers appear twice at the finish line.

Lamont Head Line Coach for Huskies

CHICAGO, Feb. 19. (AP)—Daniel J. Lamont, for the last two years director of Athletics at Loyola university, has resigned to become head line coach for Jimmy Phelan at the University of Washington.

Lamont, one of Loyola's greatest ends, became assistant to Head Coach Roger Riley in 1927, and upon Riley's resignation the next year, became head football coach and athletic director. He was graduated in 1927, and captained the Rambler team in 1926.

His squad last fall won six games, lost two and tied one.

Lamont probably will go to Washington in time to aid Phelan and his other assistants, Ralph "Pest" Welch and "Cotton" Wilcox, with spring football practice.

YOUNG FIRPO WINS DECISION OVER FONTAINE

Idaho Battler Refuses Decision on Foul in Second Canto

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 19. (A. P.)—Guido Bardello, better known as Young Firpo, light heavyweight of Burke, Idaho, took a 10-round decision from Del Fontaine, Winnipeg, here last night. Firpo might have had the fight in the second round on a foul, but chose to give the big crowd a run for their money and came back to chase Fontaine around the ring for eight more rounds. After putting Firpo down in the second round, Fontaine clipped him on the chin while the Burke miner was on his hands preparing to get up. He refused the foul and came back to even matters in the next round by flooring Fontaine with a left to the jaw. In the semi-final Neil Kilbane, 155-pound College of Puget Sound student, took a decision over Lou Sauer, Portland, after some hard exchanges. Kilbane dropped Sauer for a count of nine in the third round.

Red Stanley, Longview, technically knocked out Freddy Welch, Portland, in the third round of their four-round preliminary. Johnny Hanson, Portland, won a close decision over Bobby Druggier, Portland, in a fourth round rally.

Swede Nelson, Vernonia, took less than one round to knock out Bobby Dolan, Seattle. Eddie Volk, Portland, and Johnny Topaz, Philippine, fought four fast rounds with plenty of punching. Volk taking the decision.

LONDON, Feb. 19. (AP)—Jack (Kid) Berg apparently is just as effective a battler in his native England as he has been in the United States.

The Whitechapel Hebrew stopped Mushy Callahan of Chicago, in the tenth round of a 15-round bout here last night, Callahan's seconds tossing in the towel to save the American from further punishment. The battle was billed as a "Junior welterweight" title contest but Callahan no longer is recognized as the 140-pound champion either by the New York State Athletic Commission or the National Boxing Association.

Berg's tireless punching had Callahan bewildered and a heavy left hook to the chin staggered the American in the seventh. He never had much chance thereafter.

Berg, in his last appearance in America, defeated Tony Canzonero for the right to challenge Sammy Mandell for the lightweight championship.
