BUS FRANCHISE TROUBLE SAID TO BE ENDED

Amendment to Ordinance Matter to Come Up Before Council

The obstacle obstructing the granting of a bus line franchise by the city council Monday night is believed to have disappeared with plans made yesterday for an amendment to the franchise ordinance, according to a report from Mayor T. B. Watters.

After investigation of a bus line now being operated by C. I. Reckard of the Reckard Taxi service between this city and the Pelican Bay and Weyerhaeuser lumber plants, an agreement was reached between Reckard, city officers and officials of the Klamath Bus company.

Expert Approval

The mayor stated last night the city council will undoubtedly approve the amendment and pass the ordinance next Monday night. Several members of the council have already agreed.

The amendment allows hauling of passengers by another bus company from a terminal within the city limits to a stated terminal outside the city, and from a given point outside to a terminal in the city, but absolutely prohibits the promiscuous gathering up of passengers along streets between the terminals.

This protects the Klamath Bus service which is expected to start operation here about April 1. It will be owned by officials now operating the Vancouver Transportation company.

The ordinance was held up Monday night when it was feared that the present service now being given by Reckard might conflict with the service of the city bus line.
