CHICAGO, Feb. 21. (AP)—Wheat prices here took a decided upward swing early today influenced by a brisk unexpected jump in quotations at Liverpool. It was asserted European importers had accepted all available wheat tendered from this side of the Atlantic overnight but only after the Canadian growers pool had completely withdrawn its export offers. Opening 11-8 to 21-4 higher, Chicago wheat future deliveries afterward scored additional gains. Corn, oats and provisions rose also.
