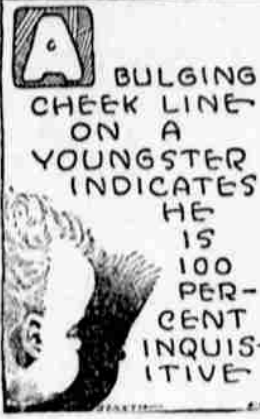

Many Cougars Killed—
A dozen cougars, worth \$420 in bounty, were killed this winter by W. M. Clark, 21 miles above Oakridge. Mr. Clark, who has been trapping in the mountains, says that all told 24 cougars have been killed in that vicinity in recent months. The cougars are so plentiful that the deer are becoming scarce. Mr. Clark's camp is on one side of the Willamette fork and his hunting ground is on the opposite bank and the only way to cross the river is to fell a tree and use it as a bridge. However, high water eventually sweeps away the impromptu bridge, and this has been going on so many years that trees to fell at convenient locations are becoming scarce.
