

OLD CHARLIE NO MATCH FOR YOUNGER MAN

White Learns Meaning of
Old Ring Saw, "They
Never Come Back"

CHICAGO, Feb. 22 (AP)—They never come back—and no one knows it better than Charlie White.

White, 25 years old, and retired for seven years, whose left hook carried him within a punch of the world lightweight title back in the days when the division limit was 133 pounds, last night attempted a comeback on Jack Dempsey's card at the Coliseum, and was technically knocked out in less than two rounds by Henry Perlick, one of the Kalamazoo, Mich., lightweight twins.

First Fight in Chicago, Making his first appearance in a Chicago ring, although a native Chicagoan, the one-time terror of the lightweight ranks was smashed to the canvas four times before his handlers tossed in a towel admitting defeat. White made no attempt to lead at his younger opponent, and plitely had nothing left except great courage. He did not take a count the first three times he went down, but the last time, was saved from being counted out only by the action of his seconds.

Was Perlick Night
Henry's twin, Herman, scored an eight-round decision victory over Emory Cabana, Philadelphia lightweight, after being knocked to his knees in the first round. The show, Dempsey's seventh, drew a gate of about \$10,000.

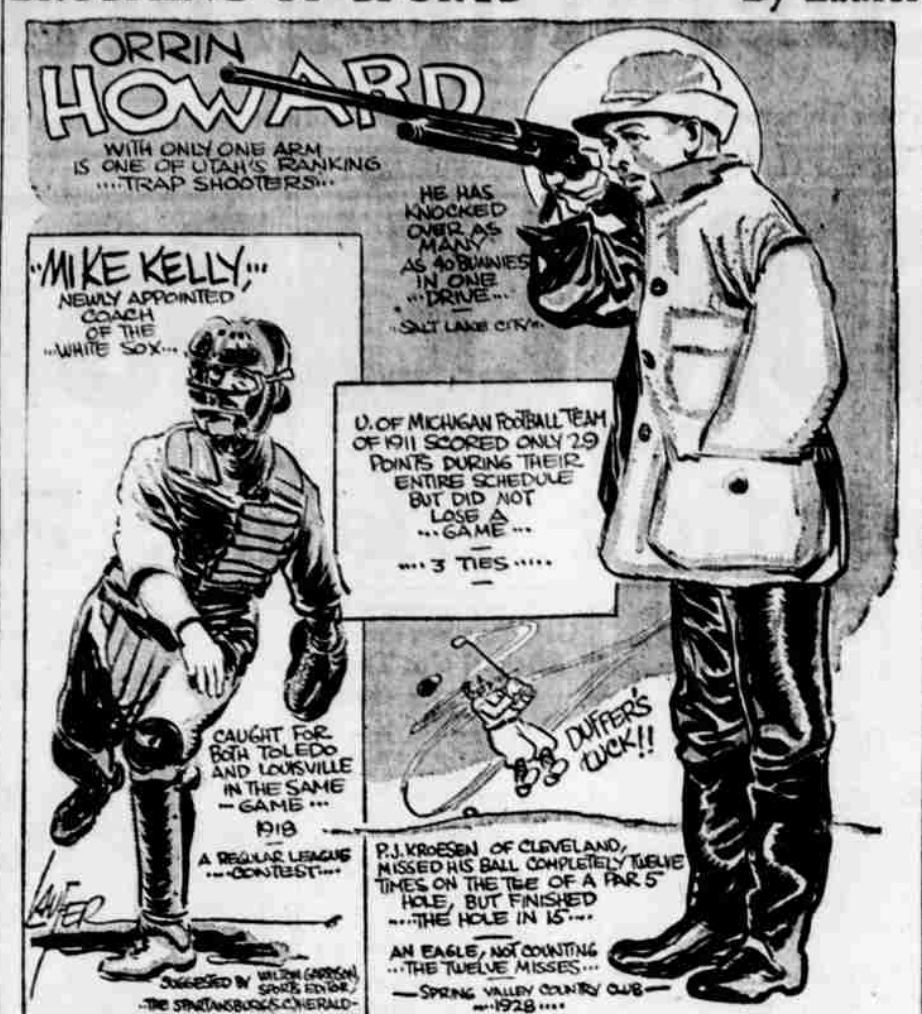

Leader in South

SEATTLE, Feb. 22 (AP)—A victory for the University of Washington basketball team in its game with the University of Idaho here tonight will assure the Huskies of at least a tie for the northern division Pacific coast conference championship for the third successive year. The Washington quintet swamped the Vandals, 43 to 15, in the first of a two-game series last night.

The tail-end Idaho five took an early lead of 5 to 1 but the Huskies soon caught the Vandals and easily piled up a big lead. Washington led 20 to 9 at the half.

SOUTHERN RACE CLOSE
LOS ANGELES, Feb. 22 (AP)—With the apothym division of the Pacific coast basketball title all but within their grasp, the University of Southern California basketball quintet today is primed for its climactic game with the Bruin cagers from the University of California at Los Angeles.

Twice victors over their neighbor opponents, the Trojan basketball team is favored to win. Should Coach Sam Barry's U. S. C. quintet lose the southern division race will terminate in a tie with the University of California at Berkeley, provided Coach "Nile" Price's five defeats the Stanford team. In that event, a tie playoff will be necessary.

Oregon Has Chance
At N. W. Pennant

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 22 (AP)—Oregon State and University of Oregon basketball teams meet here tonight in a crucial game for the Webfoots. Oregon, in second place in the northern division of the Pacific coast conference still has an outside chance of tying the Washington Huskies for the title.

In the present series Oregon holds the edge over the Staters, having won two out of three games.

GUS FLATTENS STASIAK
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 22 (AP)—Gus Sonnenberg, recognized in some states as world's heavyweight wrestling champion, won two straight falls over Stanley Stasiak, here last night. Sonnenberg won the first fall in 34 minutes with a flying tackle and reverse body hold and the second in four minutes with a head scissors.

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LATZO UPSETS DOPE BY NOD OVER JOHNSON

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—Pete Latzo, whose penchant for juicy steaks boosted him from the welterweight to the light heavyweight division almost overnight, qualifies as the perpetrator of the outstanding flaccid upset of the indoor season.

Johnson K O Artist
The pudgy coal miner from Scranton, one-time holder of the welterweight championship, gave the experts and 12,000 spectators a terrific shock last night when he gained the decision over Larry Johnson, Chicago negro, in a ten round bout in Madison Square Garden. Johnson had won 15 previous bouts by knockouts, the last three over Leo Mitchell, Joe Sekyra and Fred Lenhart.

Not once could Johnson, a 3 to 1 favorite, land solidly with his far-famed right hand.

Decision Close
The decision was close, the referee and one judge voting for Latzo and the other judge for Johnson, but ringside critics thought the Scranton miner shaded the negro by at least one round.

The victory earned for Latzo the right to meet Max Baer, bloom at the Garden March 19, in a contest to determine the first challenger for Jimmy Slattery, recognized as light heavyweight champion by the New York state athletic commission.

Hall Introduces Spears.
"Doc" Spears was introduced by Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the University of Oregon. The new mentor paid tribute to Cal Young, Oregon's first football coach, who previously told of organizing the first squad and ending the year with an intact 1000 percent—through a record of one game, one victory.

Dr. Spears spoke on football for its own value, rather than an attempt to make it under far-fung phrases of returns to the state by publicity and character building. He said it was impossible for any coach to instill fight into men but that the fight,

inherited by men from the community in which they were reared, often was aroused on the football field.

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Wallgren to Have
Chance at Title

SEATTLE, Feb. 22. (AP)—Mon Wallgren of Everett, Wash., will have a chance to regain the national amateur balking billiard championship next month.

Wallgren won the Pacific coast title and the honor to represent the far west in the national meet at St. Louis March 19 to 25 when he defeated Robert Fouts of Los Angeles in the final block of their three-day match here last night. The former champion captured the last block of 300 to 29 for a grand victory of 900 to 450.

The Everett ace wound up last night's block in quick time, making three high runs of 60, 51 and 42. The match went 17 innings for the three blocks.

Wallgren had an average of 11.7 points for the 900 and Fouts 5.9.

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
