BILL TO BUY POWER SITE IS APPROVED

Wilbur Sanctions Move And McNary Places Bill in Senate

For some years it was the understanding of the board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation District that no power rights were included with irrigation, although seven years ago about 25 power plants were operated by other irrigation projects. Over a million kilowatt hours per year were generated by these plants, with a net revenue of \$5,500,000 per year to the district.

In later years, some of the directors of the irrigation district objected to existing circumstances to the United States and when, in 1925, the United States sold the Klamath and Keno canals to the Klamath-Irrigation Power company, the Klamath Irrigation District protested the sale, but could not sue the government without.

At this same time the move was started to acquire the site, which it is believed that about 10,000 horsepower could be developed.

Secretary Interviewed
Last May, Secretary of the Interior Wilbur was interviewed by A. M. Thomas, secretary of the district, and the directors, and at the same time the secretary expressed his belief that a bill to transfer the McCormick site might be approved.

Recently Bert E. Hanes made a trip to Washington, D. C., in the interests of the Klamath Irrigation District. He was accompanied by Mr. Thomas, and as a result of their trip, Secretary Wilbur has approved the bill, and it has been introduced by Senator McNary into the senate, read twice, and referred to the Committee of Public Lands and Surveys. This bill is senate number 3556.

Senate Bill No. 3556
The bill reads as follows: "That the secretary is authorized and directed to sell and convey within six months after date of approval of this act to the Klamath Irrigation District, an Oregon corporation, all rights, title and interest of the United States in and to the following described lands located in Klamath county, state of Oregon:—Here follows a long and detailed description of the McCormick site, a strip of land two miles long, and 400 feet wide on the Klamath river, below Keno."

Ask Book Value Only
Section 2 of the bill continues: "Such sale and conveyances shall be completed upon the payment by the said Klamath Irrigation District to the United States of an amount equal to the book value of such land as such value appears on the records of the Bureau of Reclamation, Department of the Interior at the date of approval of the act. Proceeds from the sale shall be paid into the reclamation fund."

May Build Plant
"If this bill is passed, the irrigation district has arranged to finance the building of a power plant," said A. M. Thomas, secretary of the district, to a Herald reporter this morning. "From this plant power can be furnished at a rate that will add more than 4000 acres of irrigable land to the district. Power will also be furnished to pumping districts at a lower rate than they are paying at the present time, and there will also be a considerable excess that the district would sell to the city of Klamath Falls at wholesale rates."

A bill to the same effect as senate bill No. 3556 has been introduced in the house of representatives by Representative Butler.

Plane Crashed In Second Test Flight

BALTIMORE, Md., Feb. 22, (AP)—Captain Lyman Patterson, Maryland National Guard, died today from injuries received yesterday afternoon in a crash at Logan field of a plane he was piloting on a test flight.

The condition of Charles W. Curran, Jr., critically injured in the crash, was reported satisfactory at Johns Hopkins hospital, while Harris E. Kirk, Jr. was said to be slightly improved and the condition of Thomas L. Kane was called very good.

The plane fell from an altitude of about 200 feet after its motor stopped. The accident came on the second trial flight made late yesterday after the plane had appeared to function perfectly during the first flight, made by Patterson and Lieut. Levi H. Dice.

ORGANIZE SEARCH

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 22, (AP)—A searching party was being organized in the Hollywood district of north Salem today to hunt for Cleo Wood, 17-year-old Salem high school girl who disappeared Thursday from her home.

The girl left her home to go for a walk, and has not been seen since by her parents. She was in poor health from a recent influenza attack and it is feared that she may have become suddenly ill and unable to return to her home.
