

Jacobsen Takes Marathon Honor From E. Nordeen

McCloud Entrant Crosses 42-Mile Line After Seven Hours, 40 Minutes, 30 Seconds; Skjersaa Drops Into Third Place and Two Other Entrants Drop Out. Jumping Events Thrill Spectators.

Possibly the closest race finish in the history of winter sports was enacted Saturday afternoon near Fort Klamath when Manfred Jacobson of McCloud, Calif., arrived first at the end of the 42-mile Crater Lake ski race, only to be followed over the finish line 34 seconds later by Emil Nordeen, famous Bend skier and winner of last year's event.

Nels Skjersaa, winner of second place in the 1929 race, was third to end the long grind to the rim of Crater Lake and back. He was approximately 10 minutes behind the leading skimen. Waldemar Nordquist of Pine Ridge, and Oliver Puckett of Keno, the other two entrants in the feature event, dropped from the race at Anna Springs camp.

Jacobsen New Entrant

Jacobsen who was a new entrant in the race this year arrived at the line at 4:45:30 o'clock after being on the trail seven hours, 40 minutes. He will be awarded the main trophy cup given each year by the Crater Lake Ski club, which is known as the "Shadow of the Klamath." Nordeen, who won the cup last year put up a valiant fight throughout the seven hours of trail work to win the trophy, for the second time and thereby obtain possession of "The Klamath." Skjersaa completed the race at 5:58:15 o'clock.

After battling two feet of new snow from the time the race started yesterday morning, Skjersaa reached the rim of the lake at 12:58 and left at 1:09, Jacobsen at 12:58 and left at 1:08, Nordeen at 12:51 and left at 1:08, and Puckett at 1:16 and left at 1:20.

Frost Covers Racers

Due to the fact that it was necessary to hold the race and carnival events about five miles north of Fort Klamath on the Crater Lake highway where there was sufficient snow, the skiers had to return to the starting point then ski five miles back, up-hill trail, and return in order to cover the 42 miles. They returned with their faces, hair and clothing matted with frost.

A crowd of approximately 500 people was present Saturday to witness the best winter carnival which the ski club has yet held—without any doubt. Events started on time and were kept moving. Although snow fell throughout the day and was blown about by a strong wind, log fires and hot coffee lessened the cold.

Jump Give Thrills

The cleared space cut through the forest by the highway was used for the track events. The large evergreens made the setting much more beautiful than it has been in past years. At one side of the highway was the 60-foot ski jump which provided the real thrills of the day.

Polo Captain Hurt When Horse Falls

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 24. (AP)—Stephen "Laddy" Sanford, captain of the Hurricane polo team, will be permitted to leave the hospital today but physicians said he would spend the next six weeks nursing a fractured rib and other injuries received in a fall during a game here yesterday with the Argentine team.

Sanford, wealthy New Yorker and one of the country's leading polo players, was painfully injured during the first chukker of the game when his pony, Late Night, fell and for a brief moment pinned the rider to the ground.

The Hurricane ace was taken to a Pasadena hospital, where an X-ray revealed a fracture of the first rib on the right side and a badly wrenched back. The Argentine team, Pacific coast champions, won yesterday's game 5 to 5, scoring its seventh consecutive victory in Southern California competition. Sanford's team is composed of players gathered from all over the country.

Herlinger Draws Three-Year Term

PORTLAND, Feb. 24 (AP)—Spur G. Herlinger, clerk in the water bureau here since 1919, was today sentenced to three years in state prison when he pleaded guilty to larceny of public funds. Specific charges against him cited the theft of about \$100, but an audit of his accounts is said to have revealed a defalcation of about \$19,000. The audit revealed that the bookkeeping system of the water bureau was antiquated. Since disclosure of the shortage many changes in the accounting system have been made.

PACIFIC COAST CHAMPIONSHIP SETTLED SOON

Trojans Cinch Title In South; Huskies Lead North Division

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 24. (AP)—To the University of Southern California goes the honor of defending the basketball prestige of the southern division of the Pacific Coast conference against the onslaught of the winner of the northern division. The Southern California Trojans won their division title Saturday night by handing their home town rivals from the University of California at Los Angeles a defeat by a score of 22 to 28. The Trojans will now meet the winner of the northern division, probably the University of Washington, in a three game series for the coast championship.

Stanford Showing Poor

The University of California quintet finished in second place in the southern division race, one game behind the Trojans, and ended its season Saturday night by riding to an easy 41 to 25 victory over a demoralized team representing its traditional rival, Stanford University. The victory for the Bears over the Cardinals marked the seventeenth consecutive time that a blue and gold five has defeated a Cardinal basketball team, with the string of victories stretching over six years.

Oregon Crowding Huskies

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 24. (AP)—The northern division championship of the Pacific Coast basketball conference may be decided this week end when the leading Washington University team and University of Oregon quintet meet at Seattle for a two-game series. The Huskies need but one victory to clinch the title, while Oregon must take both games to tie Washington for the crown.

Huskies A Favorite

Washington will enter the crucial series with Oregon a favorite because of its one-sided victories over Idaho, 43 to 13 and 35 to 19, while Oregon was forced to the limit in winning its last three games by small margins. Oregon defeated its bitter rival, Oregon State, at Corvallis Saturday night by a single point in a last-minute rally which netted six points to overcome the Staters' five-point lead. The final score was 34 to 33.

If Oregon should spring the unexpected and win the two game series from the Huskies, a post-season series between the teams will be necessary to decide the championship. Otherwise Washington and Southern California will meet at Los Angeles March 6, 7 and 8 for the coast conference title.

Promoters Consider Miami Battle as "Necessary Evil"

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 20. (AP)—

Whether or not the Madison

Square Garden millionaires experience a major operation in the region of the box office in connection with the Sharky-Scott fight show this Thursday night, they have not lost confidence in the fight future of this southern Florida center of sports activity and pleasure hunting.

Stick to Plan

Before departing tonight for New York, where he sails next Friday for South America on a business trip, William F. (Big Bill) Carey, the garden's chief executive, made it clear he intended to stick to his five year plan of promoting annual heavyweight shows in Miami, win or lose.

Carey feels that due to circumstances which, in part at least, were beyond the garden's control, the Phil Scott-Jack Sharkey match was made an essential part of the heavyweight program, in spite of a lack of popular enthusiasm for it. As he looks at it, the garden is "taking it on the chin" in the interests of putting through the match as a "necessary evil," designed to help settle the heavyweight championship no later than the summer of 1930.

This would pave the way, next winter in Miami, for a pair of outstanding title contenders to be matched.

Small Loss Probable

Meanwhile, the garden directorate will consider itself fortunate to break even on this week's show or even to pocket a small loss. With the event only four days off, the actual cash on hand today was not in excess of

\$50,000. As much more was considered as the equivalent of cash, in the form of definite orders and reservations.

As the combatants, all ten of them, swung into the final stretch of tapering off work today, there was no substantial change on the prevailing opinion that Sharkey will win easily from Scott and probably knock the Englishman out in short order. Some idea has developed that Sharkey is acting a trifle stale, due to the absence of much snap in his last two or three workouts. Even if true, the experts consider he will need to be very, very stale in order to change their unanimous opinion of Scott's chances or rather the lack of any.

Semi Final Real Card

The approach of titanic fights finds a sharp swing in favor of Victorio Compelo to beat Johnny Risko in what the boys expect to be a slambang semi-final to the main event. The Argentine giant has attracted more attention in training than any of the fighters. Good natured, rugged and with a terrific right hand upper cut as his main weapon, Compelo holds substantial advantages over the Cleveland.

MONMOUTH WINS AGAIN

CROW REPORTS LUMBER GAINS NEW INTEREST

Senate Expected To Take Up Tariff Items This Week

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 24 (Special).—Although work on the tariff progressed slowly through the past week, due to a change in the order of taking up the various schedules, lumber was not reached. It now appears that everyone interested in the lumber tariff is ready to have the subject opened, and the senators from Oregon and Washington anticipate that it will be launched not later than next Thursday.

With the exception of one or two senators, it would be unjust to make any complaint at the efficiency of the senate since the close of the fiscal year, which was staged in an effort to defeat the confirmation of Hughes.

The further delay in reaching lumber has proved beneficial to the Northwest, as it generally is conceded that the prospects for securing a tariff are far better now than ever before, as developments of the past two weeks, both from a commercial and political standpoint, have contributed much to our cause.

Southern Pine Men Awaken

The southern lumber producing states were slow in getting interested in a tariff, but they have more than made up for their late entry by the vigor with which they have been pushing the fight since the latter part of last year. It is now a known fact that soviet Russia had planned to dump a large footage of lumber on the Atlantic coast of the United States this year, but on account of the inadvisability of taking this step right at a time when the matter of a tariff was up for consideration, they withheld stock which had been intended for this country and flooded the markets of England and northern Europe.

In spite of this the footage sold in the United States was larger than before, and the southern pine manufacturers are fully awake to the formidable menace which Russian lumber offers. The backing of the south in such a determined manner has been most gratifying, for without this support it was a hopeless fight.

There are some who presume to know how every man will vote before any measure is considered, but a close study of their forecasts shows that they seldom come out exactly as predicted. The senators have to a large extent become sensitive and irritable over tariff matters and a wrangle over some inconsequential dispute is easily precipitated. There have been so many items voted upon and so many failures to support where support had been expected that the back-scratching has become a complicated mess which is creating rather a hectic situation as the long-drawn-out battle draws to a close, and there is

an attempt made to pay political debts both good and bad. Not only does the lumber tariff hang in the balance, but it is generally conceded that if our senators succeed in getting this protection for lumber it should not be difficult to get something on shingles in conference. The house passed favorably on shingles, and as effects of Canadian competition on red cedar shingles are fully as serious, if not more so than on lumber, it is thought improbable that the

conference would discriminate against the shingle manufacturers. Without some kind of a tariff on lumber, it is questionable what will happen to shingles, as the senate turned that item down completely.
