Physicians State

Taft Loses Ground

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25, (AP)—Physicians attending former Chief Justice Taft said in a bulletin today it was felt that "he has lost ground."

The bulletin, issued at the White House, said Mr. Taft had shown no improvement for several days, although there was no cause for immediate alarm.

The bulletin, signed by Drs. Thomas A. Clayton and Francis R. Hagner, read: "The former chief justice has shown no improvement for several days. While there is no immediate alarm, it is felt that he has lost ground."

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 5 (AP)—Three Chinese, each slain by blows which crushed the skull, were found in a deserted ranch house near here today. After a preliminary examination police said they could not determine whether robbery or an outbreak of war between Chinese gangs motivated the assaults.

Diver Has Strange Experience Under Ice Coated Stream

PITZROY HARBOR, Ont., Feb. 25, (AP)—Hector Roy, a diver, was recovering today from the effects of five hours imprisonment beneath the ice waters of the Ottawa river.

He was drawn into a deep hole in the river bottom yesterday and held there by a strong current when he went down to work on a cofferdam being constructed in connection with a hydro-power development at Chat's fall.

Built Crib Around Him
When the efforts of six men pulling on a strong line about his body failed to dislodge him, three fellow divers went down and built a triangular crib about him. The cribbing deflected the current sufficiently to relieve the pressure so the imprisoned diver could be drawn up. He suffered chiefly from the extreme coldness of the water.

Danish Diver Lost Life

A month ago, Peter Trans, a Danish diver, lost his life when he was caught beneath the waters of Riviere Aux Outardes on the north shore of the St. Lawrence river, while engaged in similar work. His body was recovered after he had been under water more than 72 hours.

Officer's Family Taken by Malady

PEIPING, China, Feb. 25, (AP)—Mrs. Margaret Gorman Rupertus, of Albany, N. Y., wife of Major William Rupertus, second in command of the American marine legion guard, died late today, ten hours after the death of her 11-year old son, William Jr. Both deaths were from scarlet fever.

Queen of Sweden Slightly Better

ROME, Feb. 25, (AP)—Condition of Queen Victoria of Sweden, who is ill at the Swedish Royal Villa here, was described today as "grave but stationary."

Stockholm is being kept informed of developments and the principle has been adopted that no news will be given out until the Swedish capital first has been informed.

Her majesty's physician, doctor Munthe, has not left the villa recently, but King Gustav, yesterday afternoon, when he learned of his consort was somewhat better, played two sets of tennis at the English tennis club.
