

UNDERWRITERS CONSIGN SHIP TO DAVY JONES

Admiral Benson Left to
Mercy of Waves at
Peacock Spit

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 28, (A P)—The constantly shifting sands of Peacock Spit, which have swallowed at least a dozen vessels during the last 75 years, today had definitely claimed another victim.

Marine underwriters, through the Pacific Salvage Company, announced here last night that attempts to refloat the steamer Admiral Benson, which piled up on the treacherous spit the night of February 15, have been abandoned. Heavy equipment barged to the site of the wreck, the underwriters said, will be returned here. They stated only light tackle necessary to salvage cargo would be left on the beach.

Valued at \$450,000
The Admiral Benson was said to be valued at \$450,000.

Passengers and crew, numbering 104, were removed from the vessel soon after the stranding. Some in a breeches buoy rigged up by the Point Adams and Cape Disappointment coast guard crews, and the rest in coast guard lifeboats.

The license of Captain Charles

C. Graham, master of the ship, was suspended for six months when he pleaded guilty to a charge of negligence Wednesday before United States steamboat inspectors at Portland.

County Agent Will Go to Owens Valley

The county court yesterday voted to ask permission of the Oregon State college extension division to send County Agent C. A. Henderson to Owens Valley to represent the possibilities of Klamath county as a place for them to settle.

A delegation from the chamber of commerce visited the county court and asked that Henderson be sent to the Owens Valley district where the farmers are waiting for an irrigation project which may be years in coming.

It was pointed out to the court that all farmers in this county who came from Owens Valley have made good here and their farms are now listed as among the best in the Klamath empire.

Permission must be asked of the extension department as Henderson is under their jurisdiction and is employed by both the county and the extension division.

MOTHER, BABE DROWNED

BARTLETT, Tex., Feb. 28, (A P)—Mrs. Edward Friedman of Tulsa, Okla., and her baby girl, about 1 year old, were drowned today near Holland, when a truck in which they were riding turned over in a ditch filled with water.

Two other women, a man and several children in the truck escaped.

South American City in Darkness Because of Rains

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 28, (A P)—Much of this city was flooded and in darkness throughout the night as a consequence of heavy rainfall during Thursday afternoon and evening. Although only one person was reported to be drowned it was feared many other casualties would be discovered with re-establishment of communications. Property damage was heavy.

Streets Flooded
Inhabitants of the low districts hastily left their homes as the streets, unable to carry off the tremendous amount of water, became flooded. Some climbed roofs and waited to be helped.

Overflowing of Maldonado Brook, which traverses one section of Buenos Aires, was the cause of inundation of one extensive zone.

Train and omnibus service were paralyzed, with all communication between different quarters of the city at a standstill. Suburban lines of the Argentine railway were cut in several places and the trains blocked by the flood water. Horses and motor cars were dragged by the strong currents on the outskirts of the city.

Murderer Victim Of Violent Death

CHICAGO, Feb. 28, (A P)—George Kereszt, who was called "Kane county's most brutal murderer," when he was convicted in 1911 for slaying his sweetheart, is dead, the victim of as violent a death as that which he caused.

His body was identified yesterday. He had been struck by a train. Kereszt was released from prison in 1926. He had been sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of Flora Sabo, 17 years old.

FREAK HAILSTORM

(A P)—A freak hailstorm pelted Tehama county last night, strewing hailstones of an unusual size over an area one mile wide and fifteen miles long. Some of the stones measured 1 1/2 inches in diameter. No damage was reported, although almond blossoms were stripped from trees.

Twelfth Victim of Train Wreck Dies

KENOSHIA, Wis., Feb. 28, (A P)—The twelfth death resulting from the wreck of a North Shore line passenger train here Sunday night occurred today when Harold Carey of Milwaukee died of his injuries.

The death followed the return of two coroner's verdicts which fixed no blame for the crash. One verdict was into the deaths of Norman Shinnors and Frank Tuzczek who were in the automobile struck by the interurban. The other was into the deaths of passengers on the train, which was derailed after striking the automobile.

Spain Hears Cries Against Government

BARCELONA, Feb. 28, (A P)—Cries of "down with the government" were heard in a demonstration which occurred here last night after the speech of Jose Antonio Sanchez-Guerra, former premier, in Madrid, denouncing the monarchy.

A crowd of 1000 persons stormed a newspaper vendor seeking copies of extra editions in which the former premier's speech was carried. Fights resulted, the police intervening and arresting two.

Then the crowd turned upon the police and demanded release of those detained. The police retaliated by arresting three more, while the crowd shouted epithets and denunciations of the government.
