

JURY CONVICTS TWO BROTHERS

Burtons Guilty of Assault With Deadly Weapon, Is Verdict

George Russell Burton and Stanley Burton were last night convicted by a circuit court jury of assault with a dangerous weapon on Fred Gerke and Clyde Johnson, Klamath loggers. The jury reported after being out 4 hours and a half after once returning for instructions in regard to penalties on the crime charged.

In the verdict which was returned the jury recommended leniency, leaving the sentence to be imposed up to Circuit Judge Duncan, who heard the case. The penalty for the crime is not less than six months nor more than 19 years in the state penitentiary, or not less than a fine of \$100 nor more than \$1,000.

Burtons' Guilt at Verdict. The defendants took the verdict calmly and after Judge Duncan had praised the jury for the manner in which they heard the trial and had excused the jury until March 3, the Burtons talked to their mother, Mrs. Gunther, and Mrs. George Russell Burton, who sat by the defendants throughout the trial.

In closing arguments J. H. Napier, who opened for the defense, recited the evidence, stated that the Burtons fought in self defense; charged that Gerke and Johnson used "canned heat" as a drink; and that the defendants left after the fight to avoid being incarcerated in jails here which are dirty. He stated that they came from Texas.

Loggers Attacked, Praised. U. S. Valentine closed for the defense and upheld the defendants' actions. A defense attor-

ney stated that Gerke and Johnson were loggers and that they had no respect for women and that the men who were beaten had insulted Mrs. George Burton whose character he said was unimpeachable.

T. H. Gillenwaters, deputy district attorney, in closing for the state defended the loggers, saying that "nowhere will you find a group of men with more respect for a woman who deserves respect." He referred to Mrs. Burton as the "Angel." He stated that the Burtons had planned the assault and robbery and that they had then gotten Gerke and Johnson drunk and carried out their plans. The jury did not find the Burtons guilty of robbery.

Large Audience Present. A large gallery listened to the trial and the court room was about half filled with people last night when the jury came in, even though it was late in the evening and many had been sitting there for several hours.

The verdict read: "We, the jury, being first duly impeached and sworn to try the above entitled case, find the defendant, George Burton, is guilty of assault with a dangerous weapon and the defendant, Stanley Burton, is guilty of assault with a dangerous weapon. We, the jury, recommend leniency. H. E. Hamaker, foreman."

Is Habitual Criminal. Although the jury recommended leniency the fact that Oregon has a habitual criminal act making a fourth offender liable to a life term in the state penitentiary, and as George Russell Burton has three previous convictions in other states, may affect the sentence. Whether or not all facts will be taken into consideration is not known.

The jury which heard the case was composed of Harry Richardson, Fred Flock, Jess Jarvis, Henry Ketsch, Henry A. Grimes, Homer Knight, Charles McCarty, Stanley Hajicek, George A. Bell, E. A. Geary, H. F. Hamaker and Lyle O. Mills.

Plane Pilot Sure Cattle Rustlers Cause of Wreck

WALSENBURG, Colo., Feb. 28. (AP)—The theory of a pilot that his plane was crippled by shots fired at it by cattle rustlers caused a renewed investigation today into an airplane crash that brought death to a high school girl and serious injuries to another on isolated Moon Pass yesterday.

Girl Student Killed. Miss Elsie Noble, 16, a student at Centennial high school, Pueblo, was killed and Miss Abba Talion, 16, also a student at the school, seriously injured. Harry Miller, the pilot of the plane which was owned by the Alamosa Airways, Inc., suffered a slight injury.

Shots Crippled Plane. Sheriff Harry J. Capps, of Hartman county will lead a posse to the scene of the crash to investigate the theory given by Miller. Miller told authorities who questioned him last night that he felt two shot impacts on the plane just before an all-engine failure to function. The plane became unmanageable, he said, and crashed.

Authorities who decided to investigate the crash "It was likely that cattle rustlers might have fired on the plane in the belief that it contained men spying on their activities."

Baker Lumberman Looks Over Basin
