Steamboat Days To Be Theme of Radio Program

Steamboat days on the Mississippi will be recalled by the Empire Builders program Monday night, broadcast over the coast to coast network of the National Broadcasting company. The story is written a round Third street in St. Paul and unfolds the romantic history of this riverfront thoroughfare from which the ex caris departed for the Red River valley, Canada and Hudson's Bay, and from the first steam train west of the Mississippi made its initial eleven mile trip to St. Anthony, now Minneapolis.

The musical features include Andy Sanelia's orchestra. Bob MacGimsey, harmony whistler, negro ensembles, and incidental music typical of the period.

The program will be broadcast over the following stations from 7:30 to 8 o'clock Pacific Coast Time: KOA, Denver; KFI, Los Angeles; KGW, Portland; KSL, Salt Lake City; KGO, San Francisco-Oakland; KOMO, Seattle; KHQ, Spokane.

Timber Interests Of Northwest to Convene Monday

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 1. (A.P.)—Two hundred lumbermen, foresters, and public officials of the United States and Canadian forest authorities will convene here Monday for a three-day conference on western forestry affairs. The twenty-first anniversary of this clearing house for private, state and governmental forest agencies, is sponsored by the western forestry and conservation association.

The keynote of the conference will be the problem of keeping up cooperation in forest protection and the productivity of cut-over lands. Topics include protective organization, methods and equipment, fire weather study, logging hazards, forest insurance and classification, public timber supply and lumber by-products. Several regional federal boards, recently organized to coordinate all governmental activities dealing with the prevention of forest fires, insects and disease, will be represented.
