Southern Pacific Event Draws Enthusiastic Crowd at KR

They came, they bowled, they departed for home voting that Klamath Falls and its people were the best ever. That was the verdict of the S. P. employees who bowled, as well as the large crowd of rooters who accompanied them here to participate in the first annual tournament of its kind, which was held at the Klamath Recreation yesterday.

Portland No. 1 took first honors with the score of 2661, their final game was a dandy, Berke getting 203 while Velton contributed a mighty 245 as their teammates trailed with creditable showings.

Sacramento No. 1 came in second with 2415, Reeves doing the heavy work in all three games and ending with 223.

HUSKIES AND TROJANS MEET FRIDAY NIGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3. (AP)—Washington's Huskies and Southern California's Trojans basketball teams will fight it out this week for the Pacific Coast conference championship, the first contest to be played Friday. Washington won the northern division championship by their two victories over Oregon, 32 to 25 and 35 to 31. Washington State advanced into second place by taking two games from the Idaho Vandals, 36 to 23 and 47 to 24, while Oregon dropped from second to third place, with Oregon State fourth and Idaho in the cellar position.

Northern Race Hot

The northern division race was hotly contested and was featured by the remarkable comeback of the Oregon team after getting off to a slow start. The Huskies walked through all opposition except Oregon State, which team won three out of four games from the leaders.

Dempsey to Fight If Schmeling Wins

CLEVELAND, March 3. (AP)—Jack Dempsey, former world's heavyweight champion, announced definitely here today that he would fight again for the championship if Max Schmeling should defeat Jack Sharkey in June and provided Dempsey can reach fighting condition again.

The former "tiger of the ring" was in Cleveland to act as master of ceremonies at the Ohio sportsman's show.

Dempsey said he believes Schmeling is over rated and Sharkey can defeat the German. If this belief proves true, Dempsey said his "comeback" plans would be abandoned.

C. Doyle Captures Heavyweight Title

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3. (AP)—Clarence Doyle, Olympic club, San Francisco, slugged his way to a close decision over Tom Elliott, Los Angeles, coast title holder, to capture the crown in the heavyweight class in the finals of the Pacific Coast amateur bouts here Saturday night. An extra session was necessary to pick the winner.

California captured five of the eight titles, Washington took two and one Oregonian emerged victorious. Tommy Pratt of the South Parkway club, Portland, knocked out Jack Crowley, young men's institute, San Francisco, in the first round to win the middleweight championship. R. J. McDonald, Lakewood, Ore., was unable to meet Angelo Fuceto, Olympic club, in the 118-pound championship match because of an injured eye received in a semi-final bout.

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GREYOLA NEW STAR OF AGUA CALIENTE MEET

Filly Owned by Raoul Walsh, Film Star, Is Sensation

AGUA CALIENTE, Lower California, March 3. (AP)—Greyola, a 3-year-old, today takes her place among the turf's great fillies, and her owner of three days, Raoul Walsh, Hollywood movie director, takes his place as a new entrant in the racing game with \$29,200 in his pocket, the money won by the daughter of Grey Lag yesterday in the Agua Caliente derby.

Leads Field of 14
In one of the best exhibitions of running seen here this winter, Greyola galloped the mile and one eighth to lead a field of 14 starters by a scant length in this, the second largest money event of the Agua Caliente Jockey club.

Walsh had purchased the filly Saturday for a reported price of \$15,000. Her time was 1 minute 51 4-5 seconds.

Started Third
Leaving the post in third place, Greyola took the lead at the first turn and was never headed, although Longus, William Hoffman's entry from Ventura, Calif., came up in a fight at the finish, which seemed for a moment too much for the Miss's noble efforts. Third place went to Tonto Rock from the ranch of Fred Almy, Green Valley, Ariz.

Greyola responded nicely to the riding of Jockey Frankie Catrone, to increase her lead in the back stretch to two lengths over Good-and-Hot, belonging to John McKeon, Ontario, Calif., the horse which left the chute two strides in front of the field. Tonto Rock and Longus came up fast on the final drive, closing in on the winner, after Good-and-Hot faltered and dropped behind, to finish a bad sixth.

Rich Stake in Sight
The triumph placed the dashing 3-year-old in the class of important contenders for the feature race of the season, the Agua Caliente handicap, which holds the world's richest stake of \$40,000. This classic is booked for March 22nd.

Klamath fight fans will await with interest news from the ring-side at Los Angeles tonight. If Willie takes this Mexican it will be but a vindication of the belief Klamathites have in him—that he is the best two-handed boxer on the coast in his weight.
