

PELICAN BOYS GRADE CHAMPS

Win From Fremont Makes Eight Straight For Entire Season

The quintet representing the Pelican grade school won the trophy for the basketball championship of Klamath grade schools by winning from Fremont, 24 to 17. They scored 318 points to their opponents' 91, averaging almost 40 points per game, to take eight straight wins, with no losses. Fremont, defending champions of last year, were runners-up with six wins and two losses.

Physical education in the grade schools is under the supervision of Joe Peak, graduate from the physical education school at the University of Oregon. He has fostered competitive athletics in the grades with the view of giving the student an ideal to strive for as a further incentive to the task of body building and the strengthening the co-ordinations of mind and body.

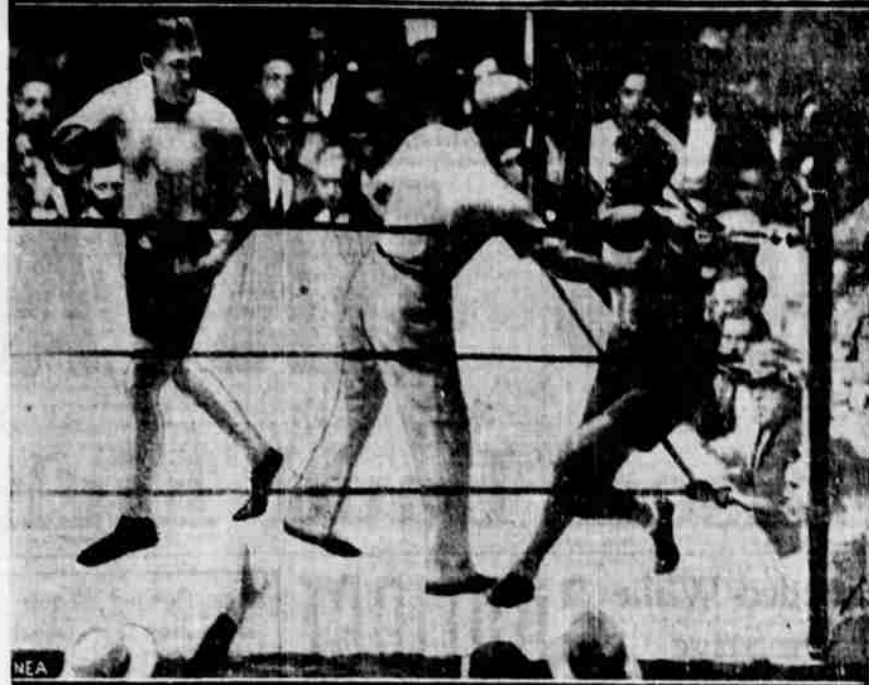

MAJOR LEAGUE PROSPECTS

More Punch at Bat is Need of St. Louis Browns Says Bill Killifer, Sandy-Haired Manager, in Pre-Season Forecast.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., March 5, (AP)—Baseball and boxing do not have a great deal in common, but there is one essential factor necessary to success in either sport.

"A boxer must start with the punch," says Gene Tunney. "That is his main asset."

"A ball team must have good pitching, and we have it," says Bill Killifer, keen-eyed, sandy-haired manager of the St. Louis Browns, "but we can use more punch at the bat."

Needs Slugging Outfielder
Given another slugging outfielder of the type of Heinie Manush, improved stick work on the part of some of the other regulars, and the Browns would be as formidable as any outfit challenging the hold of the Athletics on the American league championship.

Killifer is searching for the remedies while also hoping his holdout worries will soon be over.

Pitching Staff O. K.
The Browns have one of the finest pitching staffs in either league, with Gray, Crowder, Stewart, Oden and Blalocker as the "big five," besides a number of likely prospects in training here, including Dick Coffman. They have, in Killifer's opinion, one of the greatest young catchers to come up in years in 24-year-old Dick Ferrill, brother to Joe Ley Ferrill, sensational Cleveland pitcher. They have a great first baseman in the veteran Lu Blue, a fine keystone pair in Melillo and Kress, two hard-hitting outfielders in Manush and Fred Schulte. There is an excellent blending of age and youth, experience and aggressiveness in the club, manifest to anyone who observes the spirited workouts under the kindly but energetic Killifer.

Lack Offensive Strength
As it shapes up today, however, the team lacks the offensive strength to be more than a menace to the Athletics, although the Browns last season came as close as any club in the league to breaking even with the world's champions. Unless they are carried through by spectacular pitching, the Browns have little chance to beat out the Yankees, and they will be pressed by a first division Cleveland for a Detroit division berth.

St. Louis was third in 1928, and fourth last year under Dan Howley.

"If money could buy it, we would have hitting strength now," remarked Killifer. "The club has been willing to pay high for what it needs, but good young players, or even good veterans who can hit, are not to be plucked at random. We made Washington a flattering offer for Goose Goslin, but it was rejected."

Manush Siege Gun
The siege gun of the Browns is Manush, who was barely beaten out for the American league batting crown by Goslin in 1928, batted .355 last season, and looked to be in condition now for a great year. Bronzed by a winter on the sands at Palm Beach, Manush has the build of a Stanford shot-putter or a Greek discus-thrower.

With Manush in left and Schulte, a .300 slicker, in center, the rightfield post has developed a scramble among Morris Badgro, Earl McNeely and Fred Bennett, who hit .368 last season for Wichita Falls in the Texas league. If he could field like McNeely, Bennett might get the call.

Third Base Problem
Third base is the only infield problem. Sammy Haie, obtained from the Athletics, may find the change of scenery a benefit, and beat out the fast-fielding but light hitting Frank O'Rourke. In that case O'Rourke would hold the general infield utility job. Ralph Kress, the strapping young shortstop over whose performance brewed the internal club strife that ended with the retirement of Howley as manager last year, will have no opposition for the job this spring. He was one of the three .300 hitters on the team in 1929, and one of the best shortfielders in the league.

Gray and Crowder, the right-hand pitching ace, won't be worked quite so hard this year, Killifer says.

Governor's Private Secretary Resigns
SALEM, Ore., March 5, (AP)—Miss Beatrice Walton late yesterday confirmed a report, emanating from Portland, that she had resigned as private secretary to Governor Norblad. She said the resignation was submitted February 29 and would be effective March 15.

She said she promised the governor to withhold publication of the resignation for a time to save the executive embarrassment. She added that her plans were uncertain.

Name Successor Soon
While in Astoria yesterday the governor is quoted as saying he probably would announce the appointment of Miss Walton's successor within 48 hours.

Miss Walton's home is in Salem. After being graduated from Mills College she taught at Astoria. She then became attached to the state department of education where she remained a number of years. Governor Patterson appointed her chief of his clerical department. At the resignation of Hal Hoss as secretary to Patterson Miss Walton was appointed in his place. She was retained when Norblad became governor.

Miss Walton is studying law.

SCHOOL GIRLS INJURED.

SALEM, Ore., March 5 (AP)—Playing in championship form, Salem high school's basketball squad last night defeated the Chemawa Indians, 44 to 22. Salem took an early lead and was never threatened. The game had no bearing on the contest for leadership in district 7, since Salem automatically enters the state tournament. Chemawa is favored to represent this district, although the team has to play several games before gaining the right.
