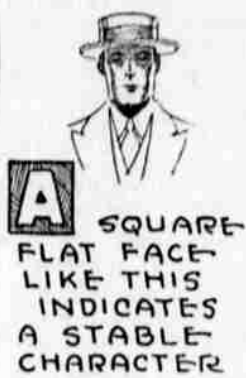

MRS. ELLINGSON RETURNS FROM STATE MEETING

Mrs. R. P. Ellingson, who was a delegate to the fifteenth annual meeting of the Oregon Tuberculosis association which met in Portland recently, reported upon her return home that the two-day health session was one of the most interesting and valuable occasions of its kind ever held in the state, and that many matters were discussed there which will be of help to the Klamath County Public Health association in its disease prevention and health conservation work in this county.

With Mrs. Ellingson were Mrs. Burt Hawkins and Miss Maile Wetzel.

Read County Report.
The report of the activities of this county's health association for 1929 was read by Mrs. Ellingson.

Twenty counties in the state were reported to have exceeded their 1928 sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals, this county being one of them, with the total sale for the state 5,500,000 seals or \$55,000. The returns from the annual Christmas seal sale are the chief source of funds for the work of the local association.

County Record Excellent.
"We are all so pleased with the excellent record that our own county health association has made during the past year," Mrs. Ellingson said. "But it could not have been possible without the excellent cooperation of so many people in this county. We know you are all proud of the excellent health record of our county which is shown in the fact that Klamath county is one of the 20 counties of the state that has a public health association affiliated with the Oregon Tuberculosis association, is one of the 2 counties that have a county public health nursing service, and one of the seven counties with a full time health unit."

Mrs. Ellingson also spoke of the cooperation offered to the public health work in this county and throughout the state, by the Oregon State Medical Society, through the courtesy of Dr. Wilson Johnson, president of that society.

Nurses' Institute Practical Service to Mother and Babe

The nurses' institute on maternity and infant care, held in four sessions on Monday and Tuesday, March 3 and 4, at the Willard Hotel, was one of the most important meetings ever held in this city. Klamath Falls is one of three towns in the state of Oregon that has had one of these institutes.

The institute was conducted by Miss Anita Jones, of Maternity Center, New York City, in cooperation with Miss Eleanor Thompson, of the University of Oregon Extension in Portland, and director of public health nurse for the state of Oregon.

Attendance at all the sessions was very good, and after the evening meeting Tuesday night, a social time was enjoyed, taking the place of the regular monthly meeting of the Klamath County Nurses association.

Miss Eleanor Thompson, in addition to her talks at the nurses institute on maternity and infant care, made several trips into the rural districts, as well as addressing the girls' league of the Klamath Union high. On Tuesday morning, Miss Thompson talked at Bonanza and Henley.

Miss Anita Jones, of the Maternity Center of New York City, talked to the girls of Mrs. Paul

demand it, and then, and only then, will they get it."

Care Not Realized

Two-thirds of the women who die in child birth, die needlessly, and many times it is only because they did not realize the need of proper early care.

Dr. Jennings C. Litzberg, chief of the department of obstetrics and gynecology of the University of Minnesota, says, "If the medical profession could only be induced to apply the knowledge it already has, maternal mortality would be reduced by two-thirds, and 10,000 more mothers would be saved to their families and communities."

Solution Needed

According to Victor Heiser, of the International health board of the Rockefeller Foundation, the United States enjoys small pox and maternal mortality to a greater extent than any other country in the world except India. The problem of maternal mortality in such proportions in a country like the United States, boasting, (and rightly) of its resources and its progress, cries for solution.

The Jones-Cooper bill, introduced into congress on February 14, 1930, provides for a yearly appropriation of \$1,500,000 for a health and educational program which is aimed at this very problem, namely the education of mothers. The Jones-Cooper bill provided that each state shall match the amount allotted by the

federal government for this educational program.

Women Back Bill

The bill is backed by the League of Women Voters of America. Since June, 1929, when the Shepherd-Towner bill expired, there has been no federal appropriation for infant and maternity care. Many states objected to the Shepherd-Towner bill because it was alleged to violate states rights, and paternalism, yet inconsequently, federal appropriations were accepted by these same states for agriculture, animal care, and campaigns against bugs and pests.

Statistics show that Oregon has the lowest infant death rate of any state in the union, yet its maternal death rate is about average. This condition can be remedied only by education, but the movement is under way, and there is hope for the future.
