On the force are many stalwarts who punched their way to this fame back in the days when San Francisco was the hub of boxing and 45 round bouts were the vogue.

Sergeant Harry Riley, welterweight, was the last one to knock out Fred "Windy" Winsor, before the latter gave up fighting and took to managing. Winsor was the first manager of Jack Dempsey.

Other members of the force known to your old time fans are: Lieutenant Tommy Roach, lightweight; Detective Sergeant Jack Cannon, heavyweight; Detective Sergeant George Wall, middleweight; Corporal Fred "Dutch" Craig, heavyweight; Jim Casey, heavyweight; Charley Lloyd, middleweight.

"The most remarkable evidence of the value of keeping the eye upon the ball is to be found in the success which is frequently found in the absolute beginner," explained Jock Hutchison.

"His grip is wrong, his stance is wrong, his swing is short and clumsy, but he hits the ball as clean, though not as far, as a finished golfer.

"But the funny thing is, that nine times out of ten, the beginner who made so brilliant a start, goes all to pieces in his second or third game. He hasn't lost his eyesight overnight or become suddenly crippled, but he has begun, however, to discover that his grip, his stance, his swing, or all three, are wrong and he is trying to rectify them.

"But it is nothing of the kind. These faults made it easier for him to go wrong, but his style was just as wrong during his first successful round.

"The difference is that his attention is no longer concentrated on the single and simple purpose of hitting the ball.

"Keeping the eye on the ball also means keeping the mind on the ball!"

MAJOR LEAGUE PROSPECTS

Ens Says Pirates Should "Be Up As He Sizes Up His

(AP)—Pittsburgh's Pirates winners of two National League pennants in the last five years and always one of the toughest-to-beat teams of the senior circuit, give early spring training promise of having a lot to do with disposition of the 1930 championship.

The spring workout has been under way in full force only two days but Manager Jewell Ens has seen enough to convince him he will pilot a club "that should be up there with any kind of breaks."

A great squad—fast—young fellows—hard hitting outfit—good pitching is the way Ens sums up the situation.

"Pennants aren't won in training camps but you can tell anyone who cares to listen that the Pirates are going to give a good account of themselves this season," he declared. "The general structure of the team that lost out to the Cubs in the closing weeks of last year's pennant chase remains the same but two corners have been reinforced.

Gussie Suhr, husky home run hitter from the San Francisco Seals, replaces Earl Sheely at first base while Al Bohl, a work-horse catcher, has been purchased from the Baltimore Internationals.

Infielders Hitters

With Suhr at first, George Grantham at second and Captain "Pie" Traynor at third, the Pirates have a trio whose poorest hitting efforts should be better than .300.

The shortstop problem is unsolved as Dick Bartell, regular last year, is a holdout. Sam Dreyfus, vice president, and manager Ens apparently haven't lost much sleep over Bartell's absence and instead have worked themselves up to a high point of enthusiasm over a rookie.

Ben Sanky, who played with Selma, Alabama, in the southern league last season. Dreyfus says Sanky is a "sweet pick-up" and only needs coaching.

Adam Comorosky will patrol left field with Ira Flakstead, Fred Brickell and Jimmy Mosoff on hand for utility duties. Foy Fraser, outfielder formerly with Oakland on the Coast League, was signed yesterday and will be given a chance to show his wares.

Grimes Holds Out

Whether Burleigh Grimes, the club's best pitcher, will be in uniform is a subject of much discussion at present. Grimes wants a two-year contract and has informed friends here he will not report until he gets one.

Sam Dreyfus says the club will not give anybody a two-year contract. Manager Ens, however, believes his star twirler will come to terms and is counting on him to win at least twenty games.

Jess Petty, the big left hander, looks better than ever this spring while Ray Kremer's bad knee has returned to normal. Ervin Brame, lefty right-hander, who tops the six foot mark by two inches, will be the fourth of the regular starters. The regular pitching squad likely will fine up as follows: Larry French, southpaw; and Steve Swetonic, Glenn Spencer, Henry Meine, and "Lit" Stoner, right-handers. Two youngsters, Leon Chagnon, right winger, and Ralph Erickson, southpaw, are being closely watched.

A battle for the first string catching position is on between Bohl, the big newcomer, and Charles Hargreaves and Ralston Emaley, last year's regulars. The "underground telegraph" has it the hard-walloping Bohl will get first call.

If spirit alone would clinch the flag, all the Pirate management would have to do now is order a flagpole. Max Cady, one of the great outfielders of Pittsburgh history and now a coach, says in all his career he has never seen a club with the zip of this one.

PORTLAND, March 6. (AP)—Ben F. Dorris, Eugene, recently resigned member of the state game commission, today characterized hinted charges against Harold Clifford, state game warden, and other members of the commission, as "absolutely false," and "political charges on the part of persons making the charges."

Affidavits and charges, which will be used in case of prosecution, have been assembled during the past year, it was said. These charges are alleged to have been placed in the governor's hands yesterday.

Maynard Cole, president of the Multnomah Anglers' and Hunters' club, and A. K. Downs, secretary of the Isaak Walton league, to whom the affidavits are said to have been given, refused to comment on the charges, nor would they admit the charges had been placed before Governor Norblad.
