

COAST GUARDS OVERHAUL BIG LIQUOR CARGO

Rum Runner Wounded by Fire From Guards May Not Live

LORAIN, O., March 7. (AP)—A man who said he was Fred Hentrie, Detroit, probably was fatally wounded and an unidentified companion was captured by Coast Guardsmen who fired on an armor-plated tug midway between Lorain and Cleveland early today. The tug carried a cargo of 1,000 cases of liquor, the Guardsmen said.

Captain J. T. Hagelove of the Coast Guard boat said the tug failed to heed his orders to halt and turned about in a clumsy effort to escape after two warning shots were fired high. Captain Hagelove ordered his crew of eight men to fire directly with a one-pounder and rifles.

Tug Bombaraded
The tug was bombarded for a time before the Coast Guardsmen went aboard. They met with no resistance, their prisoners having thrown their guns overboard if they carried any.

Hentrie was found with two bullet wounds in his back and hospital attendants said he probably would die. The other prisoner, Hagelove said, was "too drunk to give his name."

Hagelove's men took the tug to the Lorain Coast Guard station but announced it would be taken to Cleveland later in the day and its cargo of sealed liquor turned over to federal authorities.

Rum Headed for Cleveland
Hagelove, who operates directly under Lieutenant Martin J. Rasmussen, district coast guard chief stationed at Buffalo, said he had been cruising about Lake Erie all yesterday. He believes the liquor was consigned to Cleveland.

Tug Armor Plated
The captured tug was the "Sambo G" of Port Stanley, Ont. Coast Guardsmen said. It is 65 feet long and powered with a large gasoline motor.

The prospective armor consisted of sheets of five eighths inch steel fastened almost entirely around the hull, nearly to the water line, and around the engine room and pilot house walls.
