

TORNADO HITS MISSISSIPPI VALLEY TOWNS

Four Deaths and Heavy Property Damage Left in Wake

MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 7. (AP)—Four deaths and property damage, estimated by owners at more than \$100,000, were chargeable today to a tornado, which lashed Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana last night, wrecking a village of 200 and injuring two score.

Tearing through Mississippi plantations and small towns the high wind killed two negroes in Bolivar county, injured ten persons and destroyed fifteen houses valued at \$20,000. Mrs. J. W. Adams, 65, was killed and two negro employees hurt as the storm swept the Adams farm near Kosciusko, Miss.

Village Wiped Out
Heading into Arkansas the tornado virtually wiped out the village of Gregory with damage estimated by John Eldridge, plantation owner, at \$30,000. Later the storm dipped into the Harris community, about eight miles from Homer, La., killed a negro woman named Mitchell and injured three others. Five tenant houses, a residence and a church were demolished.

Residents Flee
Residents of Boyle, Miss., were warned of the approach of the storm and fled their homes, but ten persons in the neighborhood were struck by flying debris.

The Rev. H. R. McKee of Boyle, standing on the porch of his home watching a heavy rain cloud, said he saw the tornado come over the village of Skene, three miles away.

Telephone and telegraph wires were torn down throughout the area.

Elderly Teacher Victim of Attack

MARSHFIELD, Ore., March 7. (AP)—The mystery of the attack on F. E. Emmett, elderly school teacher in the isolated Eden Ridge section, was solved here today when Sheriff Hess and the injured school teacher returned.

Sheriff Hess said that Emmett

sought employment in the isolated region because of family troubles. Mrs. Emmett is alleged to have entered the Eden Ridge section and while Emmett slept attacked him. The sheriff said Mrs. Emmett intended ending her own life, because of a note which was found. She was charged with assault with attempt to kill.

Erlanger Answers Last Curtain Call

NEW YORK, March 7. (AP)—A. L. Erlanger, theatrical manager, died today at his home in New York. He was in his seventieth year.

Mr. Erlanger, who was president of the famous old theatrical firm of Klaw and Erlanger, had been seriously ill for two weeks.

Called the "Napoleon of the Stage," he was credited as being the first man to put theatricals on a sound business basis. He organized the first theatre "syndicate" and controlled many principal theatres. In 1907 his firm incorporated the interests of the Shubert brothers and subsequently branched into the "vaudeville" field at more than fifty show houses.

He brought in English artists to appear exclusively in his houses, but late in 1907 the Keith and Proctors chain paid Klaw and Erlanger \$500,000 to forsake their vaudeville enterprises. In recent years, Mr. Erlanger had been connected with Florenz Ziegfeld.

At the time of his death Mr. Erlanger was president of the A. L. Erlanger Amusement Enterprises, Inc.

He was reputed to have made \$15,000,000 over a period of 30 years.

Two Japanese Ships Lost in Heavy Seas

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7. (AP)—Cable dispatches received by the Marine Department of the chamber of commerce here said the Japanese steamer Tyne Maru, bound from Seattle to the Orient, went ashore in the Straits of Kuro on the inland sea today. The afterhold was taking water.

The Tyne Maru is a steel screw vessel of 4,254 net tons. She sailed from Seattle January 30.

Ship Breaks in Two
SAN FRANCISCO, March 7. (AP)—The Marine Department of the chamber of commerce learned today that the Japanese steamer Alabama Maru, ashore at Cape Inu Boye since Feb. 14, broke in two during a heavy sea yesterday. All salvage operations have been abandoned. The freighter was bound from Seattle to Yokohama.
