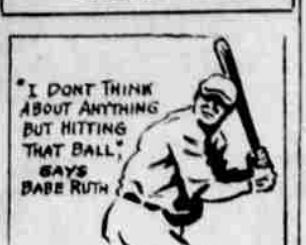

Selection of an all-county boys' basketball team is herewith submitted, based upon all-around basketball play, consistency, accuracy and scoring ability. The selection is made by Merv Foltz, who has officiated for many of the Klamath county league games, and is the result of his impressions aided by facts submitted by the coaches and officials of the various schools.

As modern basketball is no longer a specialized game where each man has special tasks, rather where each man must be versatile the selections are based on all around ability.

Allen Is Center Allen of the Klamath Wildcats, is chosen for the center position by reason of his ability to consistently gain the tip from his opponents coupled with aggressiveness, ability to check and to score. Kalina, of Malin, is named at a guard position. He has consistently led his team in scoring, dribbles and handles the ball cleverly. He is rugged, senses openings and uses his head. To him goes the mythical captaincy.

Wilds Is Named Wilde, of Malin, is named at the other guard, a clever floor man, good shot and has been the pivot man of offensive plays throughout this season. Though not as rugged as some, he makes up for the lack by the skill and smoothness of his play.

Nichols of Chiloquin, is named at the forward position by right of his scoring ability and his general floor work. He is rugged and quick to seize scoring opportunities. He has occupied the center position for his team yet he could not displace Allen at center and is more of a natural forward.
