

HUSKY TURNS TABLES AND EVENS SCORE

Question of Supremacy To Be Settled In Tonight's Game

LOS ANGELES, March 10. (AP)—The question of the Pacific Coast conference basketball championship is to be settled here tonight, when the University of Washington quintet takes the court against the University of Southern California cagers in the third game of the title series.

The Huskies from the north, winners of their division, Saturday posted a 36 to 31 victory over the champions of the southern section after the Trojans had won the initial clash in an impressive 48 to 31 triumph.

Hit Basket Regularly
Expert basket marksmanship which followed the first slump in the scoring activities was responsible for the remarkable comeback of Coach Hec Edmundson's tossers after the first game defeat, which seemed to point to certain victory for the U. S. C. five, and with it the championship.

The men of Troy had flashed a fast passing attack to sweep the invaders off their feet in the series opener, but the over-night reformation of the Huskie man-for-man defense stopped Coach Sam Berry's proteges in their tracks to even the count.

Trojans Slump
In the same fashion that the Washington five tossed away its chances on throws that failed to connect Friday, the Trojans frittered away the opportunity to make it two straight and annex the title in the second meeting.

While the decisiveness of the U. S. C. win coupled with the comparatively close finish of the second game points to the Trojans as favorites, the fact remains that Hal "Stork" McClary, giant Huskie center, and small Stanley Jaskoff, his tiny forward running mate, are functioning as they were Saturday night, all may not go so well in the U. S. C. ranks.

Victory for Washington would mean the first championship for the Huskies in the three years they have annexed first place honors in the Northern division. Last year California halted them, and in 1928 the Trojans won the title by taking the first two games.

Plunge Down Shaft Kills Thirty Miners

JOHANNESBURG, Union of South Africa, Mar. 10 (AP)—One European and 28 natives were killed and two Europeans and six natives injured today in a disaster in an underground shaft of the Crown mine.

A cage containing 28 native miners broke away and crashed to the bottom of the shaft, a distance of about 1,600 feet. All the natives were killed outright.

Another cage working in conjunction with the run-away was badly damaged by the other car's rope. Its door was torn open, and one of three European miners inside fell out and plunged 1,000 feet to the bottom of the shaft. The rope also injured two other Europeans and six natives in the same cage.

Postpone Doheny Trial at Capital

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10 (AP)—Out of respect to the memory of William Howard Taft and Justice Edward Terry Sanford, who died Saturday, the bribery trial of Edward L. Doheny, millionaire oil operator, today was postponed until Wednesday.

Doheny, accompanied by his wife, was in the District of Columbia supreme court as the announcement was made. He is charged with giving a bribe of \$100,000 to Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior. Fall was convicted of receiving the bribe and is at liberty pending an appeal.

SPEARS FINDS TASK ARDUOUS

First Two Weeks of Spring Practice Finds Turnout Handicapped by Spring Examinations

EUGENE, March 10. (AP)—A single comment—that there was still much to be done—was the only expression from Dr. Clarence W. Spears, as he closed the first period of spring football practice at the University of Oregon today. The rigorous two weeks' drill, however, was but a prelude to the heavy program to extend through six weeks at the opening of the spring term of school next week.

Turnout Scanty

The former Minnesota coach's introduction to the Webfoot football team was characterized by a comparatively scanty and irregular turnout of candidates. The work of conditioning the team for the gridiron campaign of next fall was hindered by the press of approaching term examinations, but next month the full squad of 32 players signifying their intentions of reporting will be expected out.

Coaching Staff Complete

With the addition of John O'Brien of the Western State Teachers' college at Kalamazoo, Mich., the full coaching staff will be present. O'Brien, who played under Doc Spears at Minnesota, will take over the end coaching position. The remainder of the work will be distributed to Bill Reinhardt, backfield; Gene Shields, line, and Frank Callison, freshman coach, who has come over to the varsity for spring work.

MAJOR LEAGUE PROSPECTS

Natives and Tourists on Outskirts of Waterfront Park, St. Petersburg, Sent Scurrying by Hardhitting Boston Braves Under Leadership of Bill McKechnie.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Mar. 10 (AP)—Acting on the theory that he has everything to gain and nothing to lose, grey haired Bill McKechnie has begun his four-year term as manager of the Boston Braves by putting a premium on the old fashioned wallop.

The harder and longer the Braves sock 'em in spring training, the better are their chances of landing a berth.

Punch Is the Thing

"You know I have never favored the development of defense in any club at the expense of attack," said McKechnie, "in this day and age of baseball I am a firm believer that the punch is the thing. Ball games are won by the club scoring the most runs, we may be outscored a lot, but we will do considerable scoring on our own account. If I can find the boys with the wallop."

As a result of this policy of brute force in practice, the natives and tourists on the outskirts of Waterfront park have daily been sent scurrying to cover by the long-distance clouts of the 1930 crop of Braves. The club uniform, with the flaring emblem of an Indian in war-feathers in front as well as on the back of the shirt, contributes to the terrifying effect of the boys from Boston, Beaverton, Oregon; Beaumont, Texas, and Crestview, Fla.

Neither is McKechnie particular what position his players occupy, so long as they can hit.

McKechnie has two warhorses to complete his regular infield—the ubiquitous Rabbit Maranville at short and George Sisler, still a great hitter and in fine condition, at first. The 37-year-old Maranville will start most of the games, even if Bob James finishes them, Sisler, even though 36, is not likely to experience difficulty keeping his job in competition with the clever-fielding Johnny Neun or the burly Pat Flaherty, a slugger who played end last with the New York football Giants last year.

Pitchers Experienced
The pitching staff is well equipped with experienced talent of the right handed variety. In Bob Smith, Bruce Cunningham, Percy Jones, Ben Cantwell and Johnny Cooney, Cantwell has looked especially good. Two of the best new prospects are Bob Brown of Hull, Mass., who came up from semi-pro ranks, and Alonzo Smith of Steuben, Maine, purchased from Providence. The only seasoned southpaw on hand is Ed Brandt, but Tracy Hart, who pitched against the Yanks Saturday, may stick as a port sider.

Led Pennant Winners
The man who led Pittsburgh and St. Louis to pennants, losing his job after each victorious accomplishment, hardly could be immediately discouraged, even by the outlook for the Braves.

What the club needs more than anything else at present is a first-string, capable catcher. Al Spohrer, a knockout victim of Art Shires, during the winter, is willing but still perhaps a little punch-drunk.

Hank Gowdy, hearing 40, probably can do a better job behind the bat than any backstop in camp but Hank's future is behind him. McKechnie hopes to land another mask man when rival clubs begin cutting down.
