

Dry Land Bathing Suits Not Considered Proper Among Latin Americans

MIAMI, Fla., March 13, (AP)—"The beautiful school teacher," as she is known in Panama, today held the distinction of being adjudged Latin America's most beautiful girl.

Senorita Melida Boyd, dark and flashing beauty, was voted the title of "Miss Latin America" last night by four judges at the first annual international Miami beauty pageant in competition with nine representatives from as many countries.

Wore Evening Gown
She is 20 years old, five feet, six inches tall, and weighs 120 pounds. She has long, black, glossy hair, parted in the middle and for the contest wore an orchid colored velvet evening gown. Her only jewelry was a filigreed necklace, an heirloom over 300 years old and hand-made by Indians.

She speaks no English, but through an interpreter said that after her visit to this country is concluded she would return to Panama and resume her duties as an instructor at the annex normal school for teachers. She will represent the Republic of Panama at an international beauty pageant at Rio de Janeiro in September.

Bathing Suits Not Proper
Second place honors went to Senorita Julia Salazar Loria of Costa Rica, who attracted considerable attention several days ago by refusing to appear in a bath-

ing suit, declaring "it was not proper for a girl to appear in a bathing suit unless she is in the water."

Other Latin American entrants followed her example, and as a result officials decided the judging should be done in evening gowns.

Senorita Loria is 18 years, five feet, four inches tall, and weighs 124 pounds. After her selection she again explained her refusal to don a bathing suit. "In my country," she said, "a beautiful girl is known by her ability to appear in beautiful clothing. I have no use for dry-land swimming suits."

Third place was voted Senorita Haydee de Nicaragua. All three were given loving cups, and in addition Senorita Boyd was crowned with a gem-studded coronet.

A special cup as the Pan-American representative at the contest was given Miss Mary Dean, as Miss Canal zone. Miss Dean is native of New York, who has lived in the canal zone for several years.

In contrast to the refusal of the Latin American beauties to appear in bathing suits on Tuesday night, when Miss Janet Eastment of Fort Worth, Texas, was selected as "America's Sweetheart," 44 girls from the United States appeared both in evening gowns and in bathing suits.

INDIAN MAID DENIES STORY

Helen Moses Repudiates First Account of Mother's Murder and Places Blame on Clarence Hartley

COLVILLE, Wash., March 13, (AP)—An attractive Colville Indian girl and a white youth she once planned to marry fought today to convince a superior court jury that the other shot and killed the girl's mother in her home near here last September.

Helen Moses, the girl, once signed a confession in which she admitted firing the shot after Saxon Moses, her mother, had spanked her because of the attentions paid by Clarence Hartley, the youth. Then she repudiated it, and insisted that Hartley handed the gun to her because the mother had threatened to turn him over to a deputy sheriff as a parole violator.

Indians Divided
As they battled their accusations from the witness stand several hundred tribesmen, some of them "blanket" or "uncivilized" Indians, crowded the tiny court room and passed personal opinions on the truth of the charges. Most of the older members, interpreters said, felt that the girl violated a tribal law by disobeying the orders of her mother in continuing to meet Hartley, while the younger ones sided with the girl.

Both Helen and Clarence were accused of first degree murder.

Thousands Lose Homes in Blaze

MANILA, March 14 (Friday) (AP)—One thousand houses have been burned, 5,000 persons estimated made homeless, one person killed and scores injured in a spectacular fire which swept Manila last night and early today.

The conflagration was in the Singalong district, where five blocks were leveled. The Red Cross established a tent city to aid sufferers. Police and constabulary were searching the smoking ruins at 2:30 a. m., seeking casualties. Several children were reported missing.

C. of C. Prepares For Election of Board Directors

The dates for the annual election of directors for the Klamath county chamber of commerce have been set by the recently appointed election committee. Seven directors are to be elected this year, inasmuch as the terms of office of E. M. Bubb, C. A. Dunn, Fred Fleet, J. A. Gordon, J. W. Kerns and H. N. Moe expire. Also a vacancy caused by the resignation of John C. Boyle must be filled.

Fourteen members of the chamber of commerce will be nominated for the office of director to serve from May 1, 1930, to April 30, 1932. The nominations will be made by ballot during the week of April 14th to 15th, inclusive, and the election will be held during the week of April 28th to May 3rd.

The entire election will be supervised by a committee consisting of Paul Lambert, chairman, Ed Ostendorf, Oscar Peyton, Walter West and Paul Campbell.

Closed Season on Bass Defended by Matt L. Ryckman

PORTLAND, March 12, (AP)—Matt L. Ryckman, state superintendent of hatcheries, said today that the closed bass fishing season, between April 15 and July 1, is nothing more than adequate insurance for Oregon's future supply of that species of game fish.

During the months of May, June and July, when the annual high water floods the lowlands, the bass seek the sedges and banks for their spawning beds.

At this time, he said, when they are engaged in guarding their eggs and their young for a short period after the hatch has taken place, they are particularly voracious and vicious.

The measure was adopted at the last session of the game commission, when Ryckman suggested that such a season be enforced.

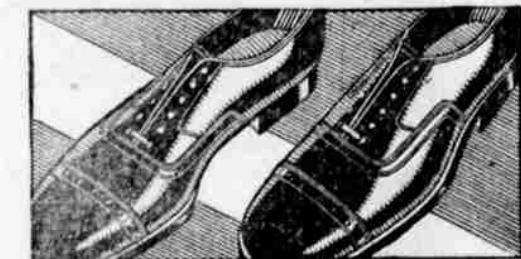
