Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., March 13. (AP)—Butter and egg receipts were more liberal than usual, but the surplus appears to be going into storage. Butter stocks were said to be heavier now than at any time for the five-year average. Prices of both eggs and butter were barely steady. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says: "Apple and potato markets continue slow and rather lifeless, notwithstanding the rather light supplies of best storage stocks. Although dealers believe the end of homegrown supplies—especially of apples—is now in sight, the liberal offerings of this class of stock from the myriad of minor home-storages have had a depressing effect on market values of these commodities. "Orange prices have shown slight advances daily, during the last five days. "Lettuce continues its slight upward trend in shipping-point prices. This raise has been reflected in sales to jobbers, but retailers' purchases were mostly at no higher levels. "Celery arrivals show an extremely wide variation in quality, and prices for stock from the same central California district range from \$3.50 to \$5.75 per crate. CATTLE AND CALVES: Talking around steady. Receipts, cattle 200, calves 10. HOGS: Steady for killing classes, but notably 50c lower for feeder pigs. Receipts 725, including 510 direct or on contract. Feeder and stocker pigs, 90-130 lbs., medium to choice, \$11.50 @ 12.25. SHEEP AND LAMBS: Quotably steady. Receipts 50.
