In his workouts here the past week he has drawn more fans to watch him train than any other boy who has appeared here and they all left highly pleased with his performances. MACK SAYS A'S FEAR YANKEES IN 1930 RACE

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 14, (AP)—Connie Mack, tall leader of the Philadelphia Athletics, has stolen the show at the training camp of the New York Yankees. Connie brought his world's champions to St. Petersburg yesterday for an exhibition game with the Boston Braves but rain forced cancellation of the contest as well as any practice for the Yankees.

Says A's Will Repeat

Connie then invaded Yankee headquarters and staid up the American league race for 1930 as he saw it. The A's, he says, will repeat with the Yankees to be feared all the way.

"Nearly all of the clubs in the league have been strengthened," says Connie. "The most improved club is the Chicago White Sox. Donie Bush is a fighter and will develop a real ball team."

Rhiny to Start Baseball Practice Late This Month

EUGENE, Ore., March 14, (AP)—Baseball practice probably will be started at the University of Oregon with the opening of the spring semester late this month.

The executive council of the local institution has decided Bill Reinhart will continue to coach the varsity baseball team besides assisting Dr. Clarence W. Spears with the gridiron squad.

Half of Team Out

More than half of last year's baseball regulars have graduated. The entire outfield with the exception of Kramer Barnes, who has two more years of competition, is out. Dave Epps, Ray Edwards and Cooter Gould, heavy hitting pasture men, have played their three years and are ineligible for further competition.

Backstop Worries

Ira Woodie and Gordon Ridings, who alternated behind the bat, are both gone and unless Cecil Gabriel returns, the Ducks will be without a veteran backstop.

MAJOR LEAGUE PROSPECTS

Peckinpaugh Moulding Strong Team and Indians' War Whoops Should Be Heard Up Around the Top When Season Opens—Most of Squad Beyond Raw Stage.

NEW ORLEANS, March 14, (AP)—The Cleveland Indians are on the march and their whoops should be heard up around the top of the hill when the 1930 season closes.

Chief Roger Peckinpaugh is whipping a powerful squad into shape at Heinemann Park. While they may not have enough power to fend off the Athletics and Yankees, they should be giving somebody a tussle for the flying banner when the season closes.

The Indians are fortunate in having the backbone of their team made up of men old in baseball but young in years. In addition they have a promising bunch of Huskies itching to step into the shoes of the regulars. Out of the squad of 42 big men, 35 may be considered well beyond the raw stage.

Last year the Indians finished in third place and were playing ball like demons when the season ended. If it were possible for the Indians at the start of this season to hit their stride of the last month of the 1929 season they probably would go rough shod over anything in sight.

No Drastic Changes

There will not be any drastic changes in this season's lineup over last. Charlie Jimleson may be forced to function as utility outfielder as his 37 years have placed him in the twilight of baseball. It will be hard for him to hold his regular post against such men as Bib Falk, Earl Averill and Dick Porter.

The Indians had the fright of their lives when it looked as if scarlet fever would keep Lewis Fosseca off first base, but all is hunkydore now for word has come from California that Fosseca is up and about, is even taking light training on the coast and will be fit for the start of the season.

The Indians would have been in a sad plight if they had lost this man, who led the American league in batting honors last season and snapped into it on first base as naturally as duck taking to water. They were drilling Henry Bonura and Alex Hooks for the job but they showed nothing to make merry over, particularly in comparison with Fosseca.

The shortstop billet is creating

lots of excitement with three lads, Carl Lind, Ray Gardner and John Goldman competing for it. Lind is making a drive to get back with the regulars after being routed off of second base by Urban Hodapp. Hodapp has second clinched about as much as Joe Sewell has third. Luke Sewell and Glenn Myatt as usual will carry the nod behind the bat.

Pitching Squad Excellent

The pitching squad is something to behold. Only one of them stands under six feet and only one of them is in the thirties. They are twelve veritable giants, eight right handers and four southpaws, with Ferrell the top hand but with Hudlin, Miller, Holloway and Shaute not far below. Others with more than passing ability are Clinton Brown, Milbren Schoffner, Mel Harder, and Pete Jablonowski.

Hitting Power Great

The main weapon possessed by the Indians is their hitting power. Every man of the regulars can pound the ball, the lightest hitters being among the shortstop candidates and the pitchers. With Fosseca setting the example and an all star hitting outfield and such batsmen as Joe Sewell, Luke Sewell, Hodapp, Ferrell, and Shaute, a lot of trouble is ahead for opposing pitchers.

With such strength it stands to reason that in a season or two, if not this season, the Indians will make a serious stab for the high flag.

Larry Benton Puts Name on Contract

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 14, (AP)—Larry Benton, sorrel-topped right-hander of the New York Giants, has tried the hold-out act, and decided that he doesn't care so much about it.

The red-head came to terms with John McGraw yesterday and immediately broadcast a statement to the effect that he was glad it was all over. "It was something new for me, this hold out stuff," Benton explained. "In all my years as a ball player I had never before sent back a contract unsigned. McGraw gave me a good salary, and I'm satisfied."

Not only Benton, but Freddie Lindstrom as well, came to terms with the club, leaving Ed Rohan as the only hold-out of moment.

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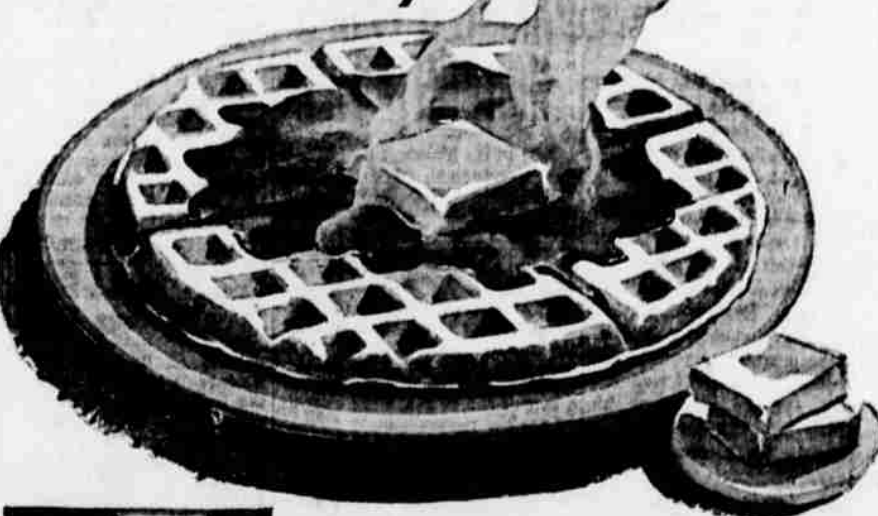


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
