Carnera, Loughran And Kid Chocolate Eye Heavy Throne

NEW YORK, March 17, (AP)—Two champions and several who would like to be, should provide the nation's boxing fans with plenty of high class action this week.

The champions are Bat Battalino of Hartford, Conn., and Mickey Walker. Those who would like to be champions include Kid Chocolate, Cuban Featherweight, and Primo Carnera of Italy and Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia, each of whom has at least one eye on the vacant heavyweight throne.

Bat's Belt in Storage: Battalino meets Bud Taylor, in a ten round bout at Detroit Thursday night, but the Hartford lad is leaving his featherweight championship back home in cold storage.

Nor will Walker's middleweight title be at stake when he tangles with Jimmy Mahoney of Chicago in a ten rounder at Chicago tonight.

Carnera, who has knocked out his first nine American opponents in anywhere from one to six rounds, meets the old trial horse from Indianapolis, Chuck Wiggins, at St. Louis tonight. Loughran, at the same time, will be seeking to find that very elusive quality, punching power, in a ten rounder with Jack Reasat of Canada at Philadelphia.

Kid Fights Ridgeway: Chocolate comes back to New York after a long vacation in Havana to meet A. Ridgeway, heavy punching New Jersey boxer, in the ten round feature bout at Madison Square Garden's regular Friday night show. Black Bill of Cuba and Midget Wolcott of New York, finalists in the recent flyweight tournament here, meet in the 15 round semi-final.

Birthday Finds Golfer's Boyhood Dreams Realized

ATLANTA, March 17, (AP)—Bobby Jones' 28th birthday today finds the golfing king celebrating the realization of a boyhood ambition and laying plans for the achievement of a more important goal born of his links triumphs.

Bobby always wanted to be in baseball. He's in the national pastime now as an executive vice president of the Atlanta club in the Southern association.

Wants British Crown: His other objective is the British amateur crown—the only major golfing title he has not acquired during his amazing 14-year career on the fairways and greens. The birthday meant only a huge pile of congratulatory messages and a short day at his law office. Bobby has kept himself in good physical condition throughout the winter, and he is engaged in plans for his spring invasion of foreign courses.

He will lead the American team in the Walker cup match in England in May as his first international competition of the season. He also plans to enter the British open, the United States open and the national amateur tournaments.

Free Throw Nets A Good Drive

JUST THROW YOUR CLUB AT THE BALL! YOU MAY HAVE LUCK!

It seems to follow, that whatever demands are made on the golfer's attention by grip, stance and swing, they should not be allowed to interfere during the actual making of the stroke.

I am reminded of a story Jack Burgress, the famous Scotch pro, tells of a pupil of his, who in spite of the most patient and careful instruction in every detail of the stroke, became worse and worse at each day's practice. Finally Jack lost patience and exclaimed, "Ah, well, just tak' an' throw yer club at the ba'."

Whereupon, the pupil casting care to the winds, swung at the ball with the freedom of despair, and amazed himself by making a perfect drive.

The deduction, of course, is that his weeks of practice had perfected him in all the details of the stroke, but as long as he was worrying over these details, during the actual making of the stroke, he had no chance of bringing it off. On the other hand, as soon as he freed his mind of these worries and concentrated his attention on the ball, his swing righted itself again.

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OREGON STATE FOOTBALL HAS GOOD OUTLOOK

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, March 17, (AP)—The most successful spring practice since Coach Schisler came to Oregon State in 1924 has just been brought to a close here. Coach Schisler is high in his praise of the Orangemen and says that he will have a much better team than he had last year.

Line Improved: Last season Oregon State was greatly handicapped due to a line which was not up to the standard to that of other teams in the Pacific Coast conference.

During spring practice Coach Schisler spent most of his time on the line with the result that the Orangemen will present a much stronger forward wall than they did last year. Along with the lettermen linemen who are still eligible are some first class linemen from last year's freshmen squad. In fact, the freshmen are giving the lettermen all the competition they need. It wouldn't be surprising to see at least two of these men in the starting lineup next fall.

Backfield Strong: Coach Schisler has no worry in the backfield except to keep the men from getting in each other's way as he has plenty of good material available in this department. The fans may also see at least a couple of new faces in the starting lineup next fall.

Coach Schisler has just announced that Vern Ellers, who played guard here in 1926, '27 and '28, will be added to the Orange coaching staff next fall. Ellers, who graduated from Lincoln high school in Portland and whose home is in Aurora, is one of the greatest guards ever to represent Oregon State. In his final year, he was named on five all-star teams—Howard Jones, Oregon Journal's, United Press, Charley Erb's and the University of Southern California all-opponent.

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MAJOR LEAGUE PROSPECTS

Connie Mack and Aggie Men Holding Baseball's Highest Office With Outfit That Seems to Be Decidedly on Upgrade. With 1929 Team Intact and Strong Recruits, Athletics are Sitting Pretty.

BY ALAN GOULD Associated Press Sports Editor FORT MYERS, Fla., March 17, (AP)—Although the full cast of world's champions, for various reasons, has not been completely reassembled in training camp, there appears ample justification for the confidence among the Athletics that they will enjoy another season's run at the top of the American league heap.

Team on Upgrade: The benign leader, 67-year-old Connie Mack, and his agile men are holding baseball's highest office with an outfit that seems to be decidedly on the upgrade, rather than showing any signs of disintegration. The burden of proof is on the seven other clubs and so far, with the exception of the New York Yankees, no particularly damaging evidence has been offered.

The Athletics, barring accidents, will take the field to defend their honors this year with the same team that scampers victoriously from the world's series battle with the Cubs last October.

Three Vets Report: Max Blahop, the second sacker, reported later; Bing Miller, veteran outfielder, took a week away from camp for his honeymoon; and Al Simmons, the cleanup slugger, has conditioned himself at Hot Springs, rather than run the risk of imperiling his somewhat tender ankles on Florida sand, but all three stars will be at their regular posts when the season opens.

Mack is the only manager in either league able to stand pat on his 1929 lineup. As a result he and his chief aides, Eddie Collins and Kid Gleason, have concentrated on inspection and development of a wholesale crop of youngsters, many of them to be tagged for future delivery.

Mahaffey on Staff: The net profits of the training siege are likely to show in better reserve strength and in at least one important addition to the pitching staff that is already among the best in either league.

The outstanding twirling newcomer is Leroy Mahaffey, a big South Carolina right hander, who came to the A's via Portland of the Pacific Coast league. He has shown sufficient stuff to stamp him as a probable starting regular.

The tip-off on Mahaffey's ability is the fact that the players call him "speed" on a club which boasts three of the greatest fast ball flingers in the game in Lefty Grove, Rube Weirberg

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
