CITY AIRPORT SITE BOUGHT BY COUNCIL

Open Bids for Clearing and Grubbing Land; Radio Ordinance Adopted; Suburbs Need More Names On Petitions; Report Diseased Meat Is Sold Here

Five bids for clearing and grubbing the 150-acre site for the municipal airport located a few miles southwest of the city were opened last night by the city council and referred to the finance committee and the aviation committee of the chamber of commerce.

Thomas R. Philipson with a bid of \$1,450, was low bidder. Others who placed bids were: J. W. Kelley, S. R. Johnson, J. L. Wanser and H. C. Casebeer.

The ordinance authorizing the purchase of the airport site by the city was last night adopted, and it was reported that the titles are all clear and have been placed on record. The land was purchased from Rufus Moore.

Request Lights, Mains.

Several property holders residing on Laguna street were present and requested of the council that additional street lights and a larger water main be installed in this vicinity of the city. Mayor T. B. Watters stated the matter would be cared for at once.

Petition for Improvement.

A petition with 12 signers, asking for the improvement of Ewauna, Cedar and High streets was presented last night. A similar petition was submitted before, but did not contain enough signers nor was enough preliminary money put up. The new petition was referred to the street committee.

Ask for Lights

Property holders in the vicinity of Martin, Stukel and Home avenues, asked through a petition that two street lights be installed in this section.

Plan Sewer Improvement.

C. C. Kelley, city engineer, was authorized by the council to go ahead with the preliminary survey of the Riverside sewer unit. Preliminary money to the amount of \$210 was turned in last night. Kelley stated this sum would not be enough but Mayor Watters pointed out it is not customary for the council to demand the whole amount before commencing work on these projects.

Permits Requested

About ten restaurant and fountain service applications for permits were referred to the police committee.

Establish Grades

An ordinance was passed to second reading establishing the sidewalk and street grades on Laguna street between Main and Henderson streets.

Adopt Radio Ordinance

The ordinance introduced last week by the civic welfare committee of the chamber of commerce, which provides for the minimizing of radio interference was adopted. Keith Cramer, elec-

trical inspector, stated all that the city would be able to license under the ordinance would be the few remaining flashing signs and X-ray machines, but that control of these would provide better radio reception.

Approve Specifications

Plans and specifications for the new sewer unit to be installed in Buena Vista, North Klamath Falls, Lakeview, and Fairview No. 2 additions were presented by the city engineer and approved by the city council.

To Limit Parking

Parking on North Ninth, part of Eighth and part of Tenth streets is to be limited to one side of the street only and traffic signs authorizing this will be posted soon. It has been decided by the council after investigation by the street committee. The narrowness of these streets made the parking prohibition necessary.

Short of Names

City Attorney A. W. Schupp reported that an official count of the signatures on the petition presented by property owners asking for a special election to vote on the inclusion of several suburbs in the city limits showed 150 names short. The petition contained names of 660 registered voters, while 20 per cent of the total number who voted for mayor in the last city election is necessary to hold a special election.

Will Install Lights

Councilman Van Camp stated he had investigated the matter of additional lights and larger water main for the Shippington district, and that the improvements would be made early this spring by the California Oregon Power company.

Will Install Signs

Upon recommendation of the police committee, the installation of "slow" street traffic signs at the corners of Sargent and Upham, Upham and Prospect, Ninth and Prospect, Worden and Upham, was authorized by the council.

"Meaty" Subject

A discussion which caused Councilman Van Camp to remark that he is glad he can't eat meat, was started by Councilman Butler at the close of the meeting who asked about the inspection of meat in Klamath Falls. Butler told of hearing reports that cattle which could not be sold in the Rogue river valley were brought here and sold. He told of learning of several instances when diseased meat had been sold. Mayor Watters stated the matter would certainly be investigated to find out if such conditions exist.

Fourteen building permits, aggregating \$29,210, were allowed.

COLLEGE MAN LATEST VICTIM OF GANGSTERS

Peter Bica, Graduate of University of Rome, Slain Last Night

CHICAGO, March 15, (AP)—The scourge of gangland—the "ride"—added another to the long list of North Side killings last night.

Peter Bica, who emigrated to America after graduating from the University of Rome, was dragged from a sedan by three men. From behind a nearby telephone pole, a passerby watched the three empty their guns into the already limp body of the victim.

On the day after the body of John (The Bilkien) Rito was found floating in the Chicago river, police attribute Bica's slaying to a new North Side liquor war.

Bica's family, however, disputed the theory that he was allied with any gang. They said until recently, he conducted a grocery store. Robbery or extortion was not the motive, police cited, for nearly \$500 in money was found on the body.

Rito, police claimed, was a Capone gangster, killed in retaliation for the recent encroachment of the Capone forces on the North Side territory of George (Bugs) Moran. Police allied Bica with the Aiello clan, once a powerful "mob," but now deteriorated, they said, into alcohol cookers affiliated with the Moran gang.

Another gangster is missing, Bennie Bennett, reputed partner of Rito. Police believe he was killed along with Rito.

Guns also roared on the South side—police guns. Two negro bandits were surprised robbing a delicatessen shop and were killed in a gun battle with a detective squad.

College Survey Gets Under Way

The survey of Oregon's institutions of higher learning, as provided for in the law creating the combined board of education, is well under way at present even though the specialists from the federal bureau of education will not come to Oregon until later in the year.

Questionnaires covering many phases of the work have been received by officials at Oregon State college and are being filled out and returned to Washington, D. C., where the material will be compiled and turned over to the survey committee before it comes to Oregon.

The latest questionnaires supplied by institutions in the state were answered personally by each student registered. Questions covered concerned the students' courses, population of home towns, occupational plans, economic condition of family, amount of money spent for education, and other information tending to indicate the type of training demanded by the students at the various institutions.
