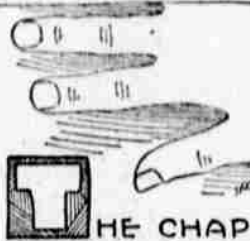

Revenue Bureau Upholds Fuel Tax

WASHINGTON, March 19. (AP)—The bureau of internal revenue ruled today that the motor fuels tax imposed by Idaho was deductible in the income tax returns of the consumer who paid it, and to whom it was not refunded.

The bureau ruled, however, that if the tax was added to or made a part of the business expenses of the consumer it could not be deducted separately as a tax.
