

TWO CONVICTS BREAK PRISON

Shoot Guards and Dash For Liberty Amidst Confusion

(AP)—Two guards at the state penitentiary were shot and seriously wounded here early today by two prisoners who opened fire with pistols as shifts were being changed at the prison canteen mill.

In the confusion that followed both convicts fled through the prison gates and escaped.

Fired Without Warning
R. F. Baltzer and J. D. Richardson were the guards shot. The prisoners, Lee Hudgens, serving a two to three year sentence, and Tom Barnes, serving a 35-year sentence for bank robbery, stepped from the line and opened fire without warning.

Four bullets struck Baltzer and one struck Richardson.

Blood hounds were brought here from Kibby prison to trail the fugitives.

(AP)—Thomas Barnes, one of two prisoners who made a break from speigner prison early today was killed in a gun battle with county officers near here. Reports at the county jail gave no information concerning Lee Hudgens who accompanied Barnes in the dash for liberty.

Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., March 21. (AP)—Egg and butter prices were without change today.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"The fresh fruit and vegetable market showed strength in most lines. Asparagus supplies were very light, but prices were not advanced, in view of anticipated heavier arrivals later in the week.

"Cauliflower supplies are light, especially Oregon stock. Harvesting at Roseburg is limited, and the occasional carlot requirements are taking nearly all offerings. Winter freezing injury is apparently more serious at that district than was originally estimated, and total production may not exceed 50 or 60 cars. Much stock is failing to attain marketable size.

"The onion market is almost demoralized; demand is very slow at all terminal points, and Oregon growers are now receiving 50 to 60 cents per cwt., plus sacks.

"The lettuce market is firm, for good fresh stock; some over-maturity offerings are drab, however.

"Fresh arrivals of good-quality beets from California are moving at slightly higher prices, \$3.25-3.50 per crate.

"Tomatoes are a trifle easier, although best quality is steady at \$4.50 per crate of repacked stock."

CATTLE and CALVES: Steady. Receipts, cattle 75, calves 10.

HOGS: Quotably steady. Receipts 100.

SHEEP and LAMBS: Quotably steady. Receipts 50.

Butter, eggs, milk (butterfat), poultry, country meats, onions, potatoes, hops, nuts, hay, cascara bark and wool, steady and unchanged.

CANE SUGAR (sacked basis): Steady. Cane, fruit or berry, \$5.20 per cwt.; beet sugar, \$5.10 cwt.

FLOUR (city delivery prices): Family patents, 49s, \$7.40; whole wheat, 49s, \$6.50; Graham, 49s, \$6.50; bakers' hard wheat, 98s, \$6.80; bakers' Blue-stem patents, 98s, \$6.80; pastry flour, 49s, \$6.90.
