

# PENDLETON HAS SALEM TOURNAMENT FANS GUESSING

## Defeat of Eugene Puts Puckaroos in Semi Final Class

SALM, Ore., March 21, (AP)—Having won their preliminary skirmishes in the two days of battling which was concluded Thursday night at Willamette gymnasium, four teams today will take the floor in two contests which will determine the finalists which will meet each other Saturday night to play for the intercollegiate basketball supremacy of the state. This afternoon Astoria will take on Pendleton in one of these crucial struggles at 4:30 o'clock, while at 8:30 in the evening Salem and Commerce of Portland will do battle.

**A Startling Upset**  
Staging one of the most startling upsets of the series, the Pendleton puckaroos, fighting a grim and determined battle, Thursday night sent Eugene into the consolation race by defeating the purple-clad proteges of Coach Webster by a score of 25 to 19. Either the Bucks were playing way "over their heads" Thursday night when they eliminated Eugene, or else they were suffering from a case of stage fright Wednesday when they defeated Dallas high. For in the former contest they looked like anything else but champions.

**Lead Half by 9**  
Eugene was held to three points during the first quarter, a field goal by Berg and a foul conversion by McClain, while Pendleton garnered 7 counters during the same period. With virtually every player on the team taking a hand in the scoring the eastern Oregonians continued to take advantage of Eugene's futile efforts to connect and when the gun sounded for the half Pendleton went to the rest room with a 16 to 7 lead.

The third period found the teams checking fiercely. Eugene had the advantage as far as scoring was concerned, adding four points to two for Pendleton. At one time during the closing minutes Eugene crept up to within three points of Pendleton, but a burst of speed put the game away for the winner.

**Salem Stops Baker**  
Salem won its way into the semi-finals when it eliminated Baker, 29 to 19. The locals took a 16 to 5 lead during the first quarter and despite the fact that Kitchen, Salem's star sharpshooter was booted shortly after the start of the second half for too much personal contact, the red and black continued to function in championship style. At half time Salem was leading 21 to 12. This advan-

tage was increased to 25 to 15 at the end of the third period.  
Crawford, guard, played a good game for Baker until he, too, was benched.

**Lincoln Out**  
Lincoln high of Portland, was eliminated from further competition in the tournament Friday afternoon, when North Bend covered itself with glory to oust the Rose City ball chasers 19 to 15. North Bend will meet Dallas Friday afternoon in an effort to gain a place in the consolation semi-finals.

Tillamook threw a scare into Commerce Thursday night when the cheesemakers held the Portlanders to an 8 to 8 tie at the half and then battled them on virtually even terms through the third period. Superior physical condition finally won the game for Commerce, 21 to 17.

## Promoters Lose On Carnera Bout At Jacksonville

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., March 21, (AP)—In a fight which promoters said was a financial flop, Primo Carnera, Italian pugilist, last night disposed of Frank Zavatta, Newark heavyweight, in one minute and 51 seconds. It was Carnera's eleventh straight knock-out victory.

At the start Zavatta rushed Carnera, but the Italian floored him for a count of nine with a left uppercut. After a bit of sparring Carnera came in again and ended the fight with a left to the head and a right to the body. Zavatta appeared nervous, and did not land a solid punch during the bout.

Several thousand persons saw the fight, but the promoters, without announcing any figures, said the crowd did not come up to expectations, and that they suffered a loss. Carnera weighed 275; Zavatta 235.

## Catholic Schools Battle for Title

CHICAGO, March 21, (AP)—De La Salle High of Chicago, exponent of the delayed offense type of basketball, and St. Xavier of Louisville, Ky., a score-at-any-price team, were paired today in the feature second round game of the National Catholic basketball championship tournament at Loyola university.

The Louisville five, champion in 1926, hurried through its first round game Wednesday, defeating St. Mary, of Walsenburg, Colo., 48 to 13, the second highest score of the tournament to date.  
De La Salle, defending titleholder, another Wednesday night performer, defeated St. John Academy, of Rensselaer, N. Y., 22 to 11.

Diglane had one fall on Sonnenberg, and then had checked the former football star for almost 20 minutes before the latter launched one of his furious "flying tackles." The Frenchman was pushed

back into the ring, and as he staggered about, bleeding profusely, Sonnenberg launched another flying tackle, and was awarded the fall, which squared the contest. He was awarded the decision on a default when Diglane failed to continue the match.
