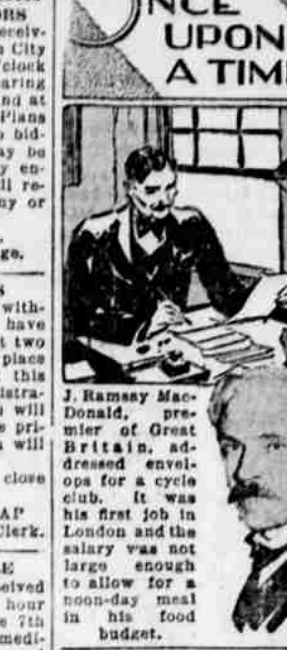

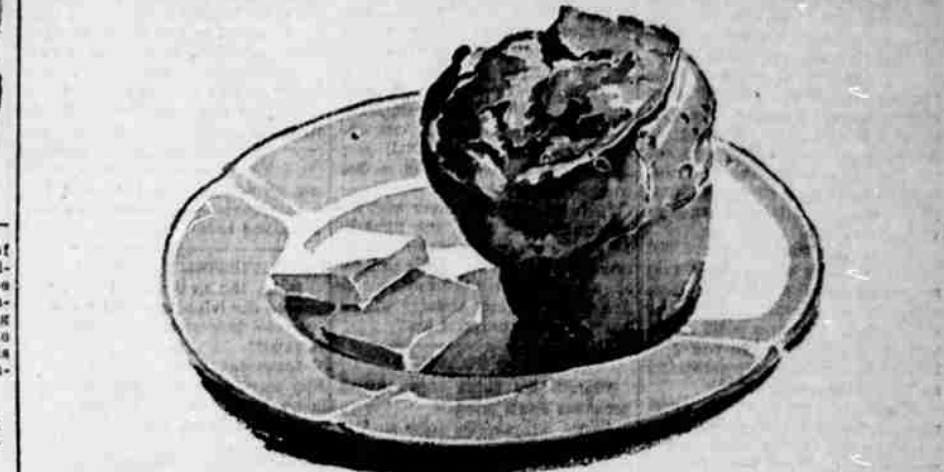
that Weatherspoon could not

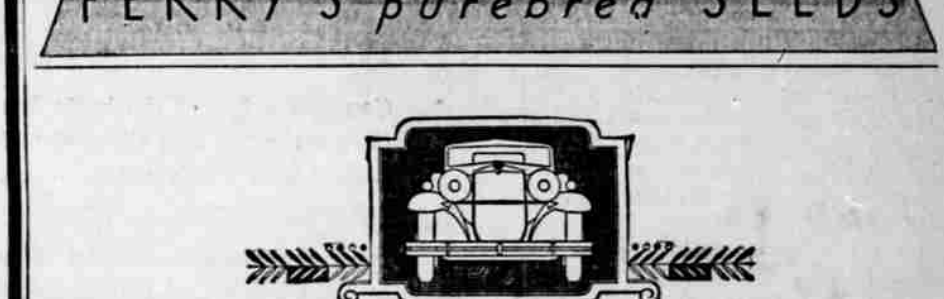
