

SLUMP FOLLOWS BOND ISSUES

SALEM, March 21, (AP)—A reaction which, for some years, State Treasurer T. B. Kay has predicted would follow the prosperity that has caused municipalities to vote heavy bond issues, has now set in, Mr. Kay declared in a statement today. The state treasurer's remarks applied mainly to Oregon, though he said the condition is general throughout the country. He said he did not want to be known as a pessimist, but declared the state must now reap the result of over-doing bonds that have been issued for street paving, sewers, water systems and various public improvements.

The state, he said, holds some municipal bonds that may later cause trouble.

Kay refused to mention any municipalities by name. He said, however, that one has recently defaulted on all its bonds, and the people in another have refused to vote refunding bonds to pay off issues of street improvement bonds.

In the extravagance of their financial policies Kay said the municipalities have been running counter to the policies of the United States government and of the state of Oregon.

Hoover Appoints N. Carolina Judge To Supreme Bench

WASHINGTON, March 21, (AP)—President Hoover today appointed Judge John J. Parker of North Carolina to the supreme court. Judge Parker succeeds to the vacancy caused by the death of Justice Sanford.

Parker is a republican and is only 44 years old. He had the endorsement of the North Carolina congressional delegation as well as the hearty support of a number of other members of congress from the southeastern states.

Three Perish In School Fire Near Chandler, Okla.

CHANDLER, Okla., March 21, (AP)—An eight-year-old boy's attempt to revive a fire in a rural school stove, near Tyron, Okla., by pouring gasoline on the embers, yesterday brought death to the youth and two other pupils.

Eighty other children and two teachers escaped from the building in the Pleasant Valley district, after flames swept the structure following explosion of the gasoline.

No Others Injured
None was injured in the panic which occurred after the blast and during the mad rush to flee the structure. Freddy Easton, who held the gasoline can, and La Wanda Dorrill, 7, and Granville Murray, 8, who were seated near the stove, perished. All of the victims were children of Lincoln county farmers.

The teachers, Mrs. Reese Carpenter and Miss Vinita Smith, remained in the burning building, seeing that all exits were used, until all children were out.

Former Minister Is Still Operator

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., March 21, (AP)—C. L. Thoroughman, who left the Methodist ministry in 1923 to become a federal prohibition agent, today was held under \$5,000 bond on a government charge of operating a still.

The former minister, who resigned from the government service last July, was arrested last night in a raid four miles south of Lawton. Bee Demondrum, a deputy prohibition administrator, said Thoroughman was found in charge of a moonshine plant. A large still, 70 gallons of liquor, an automobile and several fire arms were seized.

Roy St. Lewis, United States district attorney, announced the prisoner admitted ownership of the still.

Two Burned in Airplane Crash

SUGAR CITY, Colo., March 21, (AP)—Two men were burned to death near here today when their airplane crashed in landing and caught fire.

The plane was piloted by H. ay Sindelsen, 35, and carried Harry Abel, 45. Both were burned to death before assistance could reach them.

BALFOUR BODY BORNE TO REST

Faithful Valet Accompanies Master to Last Resting Place Among "Ain Folk" In Scotland

WHITTINGHAM, Scotland, March 21, (AP)—The body of the Earl of Balfour was brought back amongst his "ain folk" today by his faithful valet, James Colman, to whom the veteran statesman had hidden farewell just before he died Wednesday.

In the early hours of the morning the train reached Dunbar bearing the oak coffin of antique design. Colman stood tearfully as the body of the man he served for a quarter of a century was placed in a motor hearse on its last journey to Whittinghame, the old family home.

Arrival Barely Noticed
The Dunbar Fisher folk knew nothing of the arrangements and the body of the man who had been prime minister, had attained world wide fame and frequently had helped them with their nets, passed unnoticed. As the hearse travelled along the lonely snow-covered roads to Whittinghame, however, the villagers stood silently at their cottage doors with bared heads.

Buried by Mother
Tomorrow his own people will place his body by the side of that of his mother, Lady Blanche Balfour, and his brother. The coffin will be carried on an old farm cart drawn by farm horses in accordance with custom and the Scottish Laird will be borne to his grave by six old servants, some of whom have been in the family for nearly sixty years.
