

JACKSON WINS DECISION OVER BEND BATTLER

Breedlove Gives Dixie
Flyer Hard Fight
Throughout

If Dave Jackson entertained any idea of having a snap with young Billy Breedlove before the fight started last night, he changed them before the first round was over. He gained respect for the Bend boy's ability before that first round ended and this respect heightened as the fight progressed.

Experience Counted
It was plainly a case where experience counted. Jackson, more widely traveled, fighting in bigger arenas with boys of big reputation, naturally had knowledge of the game that his younger opponent lacks. But when one considers stamina it must be conceded that Breedlove is as fine a specimen of physical young manhood as ever been seen in the ring here. His wonderful condition kept him right in the fight all the time and trying right up to the last minute to land a blow that would have telling effect upon his opponent.

Two things counted against Billy. One was his disinclination to lead. The other was Jackson's powerful left. While Billy successfully dodged many terrible clips, he also met some of them. Jackson has a faculty of hitting twice with that left when he gets an opening. His right doesn't appear to worry an opponent very much, but after one of two clips from that left the other fellow is more on the guard.

It was a sweet fight, clean, scientific and business like. Both fighters got surprises and they may be a little punch drunk today, but nothing happened last night to spoil the future plans of either. Jackson, already an established fighter, will go to greater heights in the game, while Breedlove is only starting up the ladder and there is no reason to believe that he won't be fighting the best boys in his weight within a year.

Tiny Gets Decision
Some fans disagree with the judges over the decision in Tiny McCumber's favor, but as three voted on the case it is just as well to accept the judgment. Beebe came out strong in the first round and boxed the big fellow all over the ring. He aimed for a knockout but Tiny was able to take all he could give and when the cloud of gloves kind of cleared away the Dairy boy got in some of his right clouts. In all six rounds Beebe was the aggressor and Tiny was the finisher. Beebe would open up with a rush and when that effort was spent the "Coke" uncorked his stuff with the result that both fighters were somewhat jaded at the tap of the gong. Tiny can take punishment like a veteran and he is guarding against wide swings handsomely, but he still needs lots of footwork to give him something of the real boxer's status. He is improving with each fight and there is reason to believe he will take on some of the big boys yet.

Hall Given Nod
Lee Hall of Pelican City earned a decision over Frank Colgrove of Chiloquin in the 4 round special. Colgrove seemed to be off color last night and Hall was tired after a day's work at the mill, but both boys put up a hard fight and tried desperately for a knockout.

Old Billy Huff won a decision quite handily over Sammy Bass in a four round bout. Sammy was game if nothing else, but the old general was just too much for him.

Joe Blackwell, a new recruit here but a veteran of the ring in other sections, won a technical kayo over Edmundson in the first round of a scheduled four round bout. Blackwell is a little down on training just now but promises to condition himself to take on some of the best boys around here. He fought in Eastern Oregon several years and more recently has been located at Eugene.

Two midnights opened the card and gave the fans a real show.

Hudkins Praised Card
A man who knows the fight game from both ends and who sees most of the good cards all over the country told the writer that tonight's show is the equal of most of the fights in the city, meaning Los Angeles.

This man is no other than Arthur Hudkins, manager and brother of the fighting Ace Hudkins. He knows Jackson and the fights he has had and says that Jackson is one of the best in his weight. He considers Billy Breedlove a good prospect. Arthur and his brother Abe, pronounced Ab, are here on business.

Two Judges, Len Royce and Roy Tober, assisted Dick Reed with the decision for the main and second events.

SALEM, ASTORIA MEET IN FINAL

Capitalists Nose Out
Commerce for Try
At State Title

SALEM, Ore., March 22. (A. P.)—For the first time in the history of Oregon interscholastic basketball tournaments, Salem and Astoria will fight it out in the final battle when these two outfits take the floor at Willamette University tonight. The players of these two institutions have frequently met in the course of events in other tournaments, but never before have they succeeded in reaching the final game in the same series.

Astoria Always Strong
Last year Astoria went into the final contest but was beaten by the strong Medford contingent in the last half of their memorable struggle. In 1929 Salem was not represented.

In a thrilling last minute rally Friday night, Salem overcame a four point lead which Commerce had managed to secure in the third period, to nose out the Portlanders 22 to 21 in a semi-final battle, with less than two minutes to go. Coach Huntington of Salem sent in Willson Sigmund, a youth who displayed considerable coolness under fire against Baker Thursday.

Securing the ball on an out of bounds play near the Salem goal, Sigmund shot the ball upward. It descended, rolled around the rim in a precarious manner and then dropped through the necessary two points while the huge crowd roared its approval.

Commerce held the lead during most of the struggle, but at no time was the advantage more than four points.

Astoria Eliminates Pendleton
Astoria took Pendleton out of the running Friday afternoon by a score of 20 to 17.

The fishermen took an early lead, but this was overcome at quarter time when Schann up for Pendleton dropped one through to put the Buckaroos ahead 6 to 5.

The second period found matters reversed with Jeffers, Averill and Zimmerman scoring for Astoria, while Pendleton was held to a single foul conversion. Astoria led at the half 12 to 7.

Tied in Third
Drifting along into the third period, Temple for Pendleton, cast off Grom near the foul to tie the count at 16 all.

However, Ystad, playing this year for the team from the lower Columbia started a brilliant drive in the closing minutes which gave Astoria the game.

Athletics Will Start Season as Favorites; Yankees Second Choice

NEW YORK, March 22. (A. P.)—The Philadelphia Athletics have proved their case. They cannot capture the 1930 pennant on their 1929 record but on past performances alone, regardless of the prospect that they will be even better, Connie Mack's young men will start the American League pennant chase April 15 as overwhelming favorites.

So far as training camp dope and chatter may point the way, the chief obstacles to a second straight victory by the A's are the revamped New York Yankees and rebuilt Detroit Tigers, each packing sufficient punch to make any opposing pitcher groggy.

Others Mostly Threats.
As for the others, Cleveland and St. Louis figure principally as threats, involved mainly in a fight for a first division berth; Chicago and Washington as "dark horses," difficult to rate in advance; Boston, improved but still a rank outsider.

The Athletics finished the 1929 race 15 games ahead of the Yankees, 24 in front of Cleveland, 26 better than St. Louis, 35 ahead of Washington and 36 beyond Detroit. This left not the slightest room for argument. Since the boys who turned the trick for the veteran Connie Mack are all back on the firing line, there is not the slightest reason to discount the strength of the world's champions.

Mack Pat on Lineup.
Mack, with better reserves and at least one fine new pitching prospect in LeRoy Mahaffey, is the only manager in the league to stand pat on his regular lineup.

The hopes of the Yankees, under the new leadership of Bob Shawkey, depend chiefly on how the pitching staff develops and whether two rookies, Ben Chapman at third and Dusty Cooke in left, measure up to big league standards as regulars. The former champions have the punch with Babe Ruth apparently in shape to earn his \$50,000 salary as the club's pace-setter.

Tigers Strengthen Pitching.
The Tigers, under Bucky Harris, rely on pitching acquisitions to make a pennant contender out of a team that has developed speed and a better defense to go.

ESKIMOS KEEP PORTLAND OUT OF FIRST RANK

Seattle Takes Revenge
For Insults Hurlled
In Early Season

SEATTLE, Wash., March 22. (A. P.)—Seattle and Portland balanced up their accounts last night in the last Seattle game of the Pacific Coast hockey league.

Seattle Eskimos won the battle 2 to 0 to enable the Vancouver Lions to finish in first place with a 3 to 2 victory over the homeless Victoria Cubs.

Their last chance to get even for some bump or bruise suffered earlier in the season, the Eskimos and Buckaroos spent what time they were on the ice fighting.

Penalties Frequent
Figuratively speaking, the players spent a lot more time on the bench than they did on the ice. Twenty six penalties were meted out by Referee Mickey Ion for a total of 109 minutes compared with the 40 minutes of play. Four of the penalties were majors, two calling for 10 fines.

After several threats Art Townsend of Seattle and Jack Pratt of Portland clashed in the second period, with several fists flying before they were separated. They were banished for the remainder of the fracas.

Hard to Separate
Smoky Harris, Seattle forward, and McGoldrick, Portland defense ace, took up where Pratt and Townsend left off in the third period and it took Ion and several other players to pull them apart. Ion broke

his wrist watch in the tussle and although there was only 9 1-2 minutes left to play he penalized them 10 minutes and fined them \$10 each.

Of the twenty six penalties fourteen went to Seattle and twelve to Portland.

Seattle Nets Two Goals
The two goals which forced Portland into second place and gave Vancouver the top round were scored by Anderson and Harris. Anderson counted the first for Seattle in the second period on a pass from Browne and Harris added the second in the last stanza on a long shot.

Up to last night Portland and Vancouver were tied for first place with 46 points each. The two teams will meet in Vancouver next Monday in the first of five games for the 1930 championship.
