

VICTORIAN NOW THIRD AMONG GREAT RACERS

Winning Of Handicap At Agua Caliente Puts Horse In Lead

AGUA CALIENTE, Mexico 24. (AP)—High into the class of all-time big money winners, the horse today moves Victorian, the home ahead of Alexander Pantheas in the initial Agua Caliente handicap, to boost his earnings to \$254,975, third among the racing immortals.

Best in Fourteen
This son of Whiskbroom II, in a powerful sprint finish, added to his laurels by finishing three lengths ahead of a field of 14 prize horses in the feature classic of the winter running here, netting the Warm stables of Louisville, Ky., \$98,400, the victor's share of the \$125,000 stake. There was nothing unexpected in the triumph, with the eastern 5-year-old speedster coming up from seventh place at the start, to win, pulling away from a fast field.

Brown Wisdom Disappointing
It was the performance of the remaining 14 starters which caused a stir among more than 25,000 persons who jammed the Agua Caliente Jockey club track almost to capacity. Chief of the upset was the failure of Brown Wisdom, Reichert brothers' entry from Chicago, to place better than a bad sixth. Brown Wisdom had been a co-favorite with Victorian at 2 to 1 odds.

Scarcely less startling was the routing race of Alexander Pantheas' Allo Carrolio, stable contender from Los Angeles, who, under post time odds of 15 to 1, dashed into second place at the finish, two lengths ahead of Donny, the Rancocas colt from New York.

The handicap, run under Ideal track and weather conditions, was a battle among the speed entries from the start.

The victory put Victorian third only to the great Zev and Display in the amount of monetary earnings, and enabled him to eclipse the record of Man o' War and Exterminator. Zev has paid \$112,899, while Display's total stands at \$250,976. Exterminator won \$263,196 and Man o' War slightly less.

Victorian shook the dust of Tia Juana valley off his feet today, and was put aboard an east-bound train for Louisville, where he will be put in training for the big stakes.

Victorian was purchased by Hanger and Mason from the Harry Payne Whitney stables a year ago.

De La Salle High Gets Catholic Cup

CHICAGO, March 24. (AP)—The national Catholic basketball championship for 1930, for the second consecutive year, belongs to a big well-coached team representing De La Salle high, of Chicago.

De La Salle, reaching the peak of its fame in the championship contest of Loyola university's seventh annual national Catholic title tournament last night, overpowered a small, fighting team from Jasper, Ind., academy, 25 to 14. De La Salle may be the last school to bear the title, the North Central conference of colleges and secondary schools, having crowned on national inter-scholastic tournaments and meets. Calmly whittling its way through the upper brackets of the tournament, in which 32 high school and academy teams from 23 states competed, De La Salle was the favorite to win the title after it defeated the high-powered St. Xavier, Louisville, Ky., high school five, in the second round.

Portland to Get Glimpse of Primo

PORTLAND, Ore., March 24. (AP)—Portland fans will have an opportunity to see the giant boxer, Primo Carnera April 1 or 2, according to a message from Bobby Evans, Portland promoter. At Denver, Evans said he met Mike Conners, Minneapolis, Carnera's booking agent in the west and arranged for the Italian's appearance here. Carnera's opponent is to be selected.

Heflin Brands Doheny Acquittal Slap at Justice

WASHINGTON, March 24. (AP)—The acquittal of Edward L. Doheny, millionaire oil operator on a charge of bribery last Saturday was described in the Senate today by Senator Heflin, democrat, Alabama, as a "rank travesty on justice."

As soon as the Senate convened, the Alabamian shouted that a list of jurors who rendered the verdict should be kept and they should "never be permitted to sit in a jury trial again."

"If a man goes out and steals a loaf of bread," Heflin asserted, "he is put in jail and perhaps in the penitentiary. If a woman in distress goes out and steals food for her starving children she is locked up."

"But a millionaire who has corrupted high officials of the government and pillaged the property of the government can procure freedom from a jury."

Butler Inspects Vatican Library

VATICAN CITY, March 24. (AP)—Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia university, who arrived in Rome today with his wife and daughter, visited the vatican library to inspect the new cataloguing system which recently was installed with American financial aid.

Dr. Butler was welcomed by Cardinal Ehrle, vatican librarian, and Cardinal Pacelli, secretary of state. He will also be received by the pope and Premier Mussolini.

Auto Highwaymen Infest Portland

PORTLAND, March 24 (AP)—Highwaymen prowling the streets in automobiles gave police considerable concern last night. A. W. Franklin reported that as he was walking on Mill street near Fourth an automobile stopped beside him. Two men were in the car. They ordered Franklin to get in and then drove toward the river. In the darkness of the railroad switching yards they robbed Franklin of \$58. Then they drove to Madison street where Franklin was put out.

Skull Fractured In Car Accident

PORTLAND, March 24 (AP)—Mark Porter, 22, was in a hospital here today with a fractured skull, the victim of a hit-and-run driver. Late last night he was found unconscious at the curb of an east-side street. A passerby took him to the emergency hospital and he was then transferred to a general hospital. He said he remembered nothing after seeing a small truck driving toward him and swerving upon him as it was but a few feet away.

STATERS PLAN TO RUN TRAIN TO WINDY CITY

Want Band And Rooters To Accompany Team For Big Game

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, March 24.—An Oregon State special train to carry the football team, band and fans to the Oregon State-West Virginia football game in Chicago November 27, is the tentative plan of Coach Paul J. Schliser, director of athletics here. If the plan materializes, the train will start at Corvallis, and will go to Chicago via Los Angeles.

Band Boys Enthusiastic
It will cost \$10,000 just to take the Oregon State college band on such a trip. The band boys, however, who are on their annual tour in Southwestern Oregon, are enthusiastic over the prospect, and raised \$2000 of this amount before leaving the campus. The balance is expected to be raised at one of the opening football games on the campus next fall.

May See Three Games
If such a train is chartered, the fans will have opportunity to see three football games before returning to Corvallis. They will stop over in Los Angeles to see the U. C. L. A.-Oregon State game November 22, the West Virginia-Oregon State game in Chicago November 27, and the Notre Dame-Army game in Chicago November 29. Stopovers on the road between Los Angeles and Chicago would be arranged for the team to workout.

Reports from Chicago indicate that much interest is already stirred up over the West Virginia game, which will be played on Soldier's field. Many seats have already been sold back there by the Shriners, who are sponsoring this game for the benefit of their hospital for crippled children.

OPEN BIDS FOR NEW FEDERAL BUILDING SOON

Expect Construction To Start Soon, Is Word Received Here

Possibility that construction work on the Klamath Falls new Federal building will start early in June was expressed Saturday following telegrams received at the chamber of commerce announcing the dates for advertising and opening of bids at Washington, D. C.

Messages received from Oregon senators at Washington recently stated it would probably be 60 days before the advertising of bids, but pressure was brought to bear through the chamber of commerce and according to present plans the government will advertise for bids April 11, and they will be opened May 23 at 3 o'clock in the office of the treasury department.

Abandon Court Idea

It was stated in messages to both Senators Stewer and McNary sent by the local chamber that construction work could not possibly get under way this year if 60 days elapsed before the advertising of bids and another 60 days before the awarding of bids, and it at least three or four months were required to get the project started, the community would again commence action for securing a federal court term here.

Chamber of commerce members agreed at the directors' luncheon last Tuesday to give up for the present the attempt to secure a court room in the building when it was learned that the project was being held up on account of this demand. Whether or not another attempt will be made after the building is completed is not yet determined.

Receive Telegram

Following is the telegram received Saturday afternoon from McNary:

"Just received following memorandum from treasury department: 'Referring to proposed new postoffice at Klamath Falls, Ore. it is the intention to advertise on April 11 for bids for the construction of the building, to be opened in this office at 3 p. m., May 23. This allows six full weeks for the preparation of bids, which the experience of the office has shown to be necessary for projects on the coast in order to insure good competition and give intending bidders ample time to prepare figures. Should a satisfactory proposal be received within the amount available, the contract will be awarded in not less than one week's time.'

The message which arrived yesterday from Frederick Stewer stated: "Responding your wire concerning federal building, bids will be advertised about April 11 and opened by department later part of May."

WASHINGTON, Mar. 22. (UP)

The government is pushing ahead with its share of public building activities intended to help relieve unemployment and stimulate business.

The treasury department announced tonight it has drafted a program for construction totaling \$22,000,000 in building projects.

Postoffices Included

Those will augment the \$40,000,000 program of new federal buildings to afford employment "not only for many thousands of men in the actual building construction, but for many other thousands in the quarries and factories," statement by Secretary of the Treasury Mellon said. This program is by way of "accelerating activities in line with President Hoover's policy of increased construction as a means of relieving unemployment," he said.

The treasury department said contracts will cover every section of the country, with structures from village postoffices to the \$14,000,000 Chicago postoffice, to be the largest in the world.

Throughout Nation

Contracts also will be let this year for federal buildings to cost \$6,500,000 in Pittsburgh, \$6,000,000 in Boston and \$3,000,000 in Baltimore, the treasury said.

Mellon urged passage of the \$115,000,000 Keyes-Elliott bill now pending as a further aid to the federal public works program.

All projected work is outside of the program in the District of Columbia, where nearly \$30,000,000 is going on, with an additional \$10,000,000 promised in the Keyes-Elliott bill.

House of Wrigley Looms Strongest in National

NEW YORK, March 24. (AP)—The National league, although presenting the prospect of a much better balanced pennant race this season than the American, nevertheless appears likely to be dominated again by the powerful Chicago Cubs. The House of Wrigley is as strong a favorite to repeat its 1929 victory as is the House of Mack in the American League.

Greatly Strengthened

The Cubs won the flag last year by a margin of ten and a half games over Pittsburgh, and instead of standing pat, seem to have fortified themselves for a substantial lease on the top. The Bruins, with nothing lacking in their offensive power, have been strengthened as much, if not more, than any team in the league by the acquisition of Lester Bell to play third, the return to form of Catcher Gabby Hartnett's arm and the bolstering of the twirling staff with several fine recruits such as Nelson, Moss and Teachout.

Braves Weakest Team

Six of the remaining seven National league clubs, however, not only figure to make it extremely interesting and perhaps precarious for the Cubs but to put up a sensational battle for the first division berth. Only the Boston Braves, undergoing reorganization at the experienced hands of Bill McKechnie, appear definitely slated again for the depths.

The Pittsburgh Pirates look like the most formidable opposition for the Cubs. The furious Phillies are the real "dark horse" of the race. The New York Giants remain dangerous, in spite of unrest. The St. Louis Cardinals, their one-time championship staff now very shaky, face a fight to withstand the expected rush of two much improved second division outfits of 1929, the Brooklyn Robins and Cincinnati Reds.

Every Team Shaken Up

Every team in the league has undergone some shake-ups. Four have new pilots. All have put the accent on a big punch and the league's parks will resound from start to finish with the bombardment of long-range batting guns.

The Cubs had some trouble fighting off the pirates last year and it may be even more difficult to shake loose from the Bucks again. Injuries and illness, long a Pirate jinx, have again beset the club in training but there is sufficient all-around strength, plus the prospect of fine pitching, to make Pittsburgh a contender from the outset under Jewel Ems.

Phillies Clouters

The Phillies collected most of the slugging honors last season. They probably will do so again, with O'Doul, Klein, Hurst, Whitney and the rest of Bart Shotton's clouting circus improving. Consequently if their pitching is at least 50 per cent better, as Shotton believes it will be, there
