## Carvings Are Interesting

Since the publication in The Oregonian of the prehistoric carvings in Tule lake, in the Klamath basin, the mysterious markings have been attracting widespread attention, says a prominent man of Klamath Falls. The Southern Pacific publicity department took the cue from the Oregonian and is now undertaking an extensive research to see if there is any connection between the 1200 feet of carvings on the peninsula in Tule lake and the carvings in Central and South America. He also states that there is a scientific society in California which is also interested in the subject and plans a study of the strange carvings. These carvings in Klamath basin have been identified, in part, as writing of the ancient Druids, and a similarity has been found with some of the signs found in Egypt.—Oregonian.
