Rotary Plow Would Help—
Although snow removal on the north Santiam pass would be easier than in the McKenzie pass, the western side of the pass would present about the same difficulties of removal and about the same snow depths as the McKenzie, a party of four men, headed by J. E. Turnbull, who returned from a four-day ski trip over the two passes, reported. If the state highway commission placed a rotary plow in operation on the McKenzie at once, an early opening of the pass is assured, they reported, but if the snow is allowed to melt, pack and freeze into ice, the same problem encountered each year will again be met and weeks of work will be needed to open the pass.

COAST TOWNS FORM TOURIST ASSOCIATION

ASTORIA, March 29, (AP)—Formed to promote highways and tourist travel along the Pacific coast from Port Angeles, Wash., to Crescent City, Calif., the Coast Empire association, composed of representatives from six Oregon and Washington counties soon will apply for letters of incorporation.

Aberdeen Area President
Under the leadership of Carl Moerck, Aberdeen, Wash., hotel man, who was elected president at the initial meeting here last night, the association plans to model itself on the "divisional group" system used by the Redwood Empire association of California and to expand its scope to include all counties between Port Angeles and Crescent City upon completion of the Roosevelt highway in Oregon and the Ocean Beach highway in Washington.

About 75 delegates attended the conference. They represented Grays Harbor, Pacific and Wahkiakum counties in Washington and Clatsop, Tillamook and Lincoln counties in Oregon. Irish President And Ministry Out

DUBLIN, Irish Free State, March 28, (AP)—President William T. Cosgrave and his ministry today resigned their posts, after defeat of the government in the dail last night by a vote of 66 to 64 on an opposition measure.

The dail, after announcement of the resignation, was adjourned until Wednesday of next week, when nomination of a new president will fall to it, and Mr. Cosgrave possibly may be re-elected. DeValera in America. Sean O'Kelly, who is leading

the Fianna Fail, principal opposition element, in the absence of Eamon De Valera in America, announced that his party would nominate Mr. De Valera as president. The dail then adjourned until Wednesday.

Decision to resign was reached at a party meeting today to discuss the situation created by last night's defeat of the government on a private opposition member's bill involving an increase in expenditures on old-age pensions.
