He came to Klamath Falls looking for matches and fell right into a main event with the ever popular Dixie Flyer. Fraya has shown in his 4 days of training here that he is in good shape and with 4 more days with which to put on the finish he will be in the pink and able to give Jackson plenty of competition. He is a fighter pure and simple—a boy who likes the going and is willing to swap punches at all times. He carries TNT in both mitts and is confident he will have Jackson. After watching him train one is convinced he is a pleasing fighter.

A Hot Card
The semi six rounds, Joe Blackwell, the Eugene flash, who has fought Gene O'Grady three draws and lost a close 10-round decision to George Dixon, faces the improving fighter Steamboat Jackson. Both boys are hard hitters and a kaye can be looked forward to here.

Indian Joe Corbett of Roseburg who fought Rowboat Jackson the toughest fight of his career at Medford last December and a very aggressive boy who loves to fight, meets Bat Adams of Rochester, Minn. Bat comes here with plenty of good clippings and has shown in his workouts that he knows what it is all about.

WINTER HAVEN, Fla., March 31. (AP)—Barney Friberg, utility man with the Phillies, is the most valuable player in the National League, Manager Shotton declared today.

Catcher Lists 20 Leading Stealers

Of the Athletics, Cochrane lists Miller as the most dangerous on the paths.

FALLS ENTERS CLUB IN NEWLY FORMED LEAGUE

Joins Bend, Medford and Ashland in Southern Oregon Circuit

Klamath Falls is to see baseball regularly this season as a result of a meeting held in this city Sunday. Representatives from Bend, Medford and Ashland-Phoenix met with Klamath Falls fans at the Elks temple, where with T. B. Watters acting as chairman the business of the day was soon brought to a head.

Season Opens April 27
Time for opening the season was set for April 27. Games will be played every Sunday for the following four months, the season closing on Labor Day, September 6th. Because of the road situation at the time of opening the first games will be played at Klamath Falls. As soon as the mountain road through by Crater lake is open the regular schedule between Bend and the towns on the west side of the mountains will be taken up.

Limit Number of Players
The league will do away with salaried players but will pay the men out of the proceeds of the games. The burden of salaries for players has proved too heavy in the past and the amount each man will draw will depend much upon the brand of ball exhibited, which, from early reports gives assurance of being high class. All four towns are good baseball supporters and it is expected the players will fare well throughout the season. There will be but 12 men to each club and spit ball pitchers are barred.

RESCUERS NEAR ENTOMBED MEN IN COAL MINE

Scant Hope Held For 16 Miners Trapped by Explosion

KETTLE ISLAND, Ky., March 31. (AP)—Spurred by the hope that they would reach in a few hours the 16 men entombed by an explosion Saturday far back in the Pioneer Coal company mine here, but almost despairing that any are alive, rescue workers toiled desperately repairing the damaged ventilating system.

Gas Affects Workmen
Word was brought back a mile and a half along the shaft late last night that the rescue crews were within 200 feet of where they believed the entombed men to be, but the air was so thick with carbon monoxide that gas masks afforded scant protection.

This information added to the despair of the families of the trapped men, clustered in the open near the mine entrance, but still they hoped. All but one of the men, a boy 17 years old, had families.

The air was so dangerous that 15 of the rescue workers were affected last night.

The one hope held for the entombed men was that they might have escaped falling debris that followed the explosion, and erected temporary walls of lumber and air-tight cloth provided in constructing the mine, thereby excluding the foul air that follows explosions.

The blast, the origin of which is still undetermined, put the ventilating system out of order.

The great task the rescue crews faced was to rebuild the demolished brattice walls, which make it possible for the exhaust fan on the outside to suck air through the mine.

The Red Cross yesterday established a canteen that served coffee and food to those who waited and feared and hoped.

Baltimore Police After Murderer

SAN FRANCISCO, March 31. (AP)—James Bryson, 35, who forfeited \$250 bail here Friday when he failed to appear for trial on grand theft charges, today was being sought by police in Pacific coast cities as an escaped murderer from the Maryland state penitentiary. Bryson, Baltimore police have advised Chief of Police William J. Quinn here, was convicted under the name of Jack Hart, and escaped a year ago.

Identification of Bryson as the escaped convict was made by Police Chief L. V. Jenkins of Portland.
