Members of the St. Rita bridge club will meet Tuesday afternoon at the Sacred Heart parish hall with Mrs. Corcoran presiding as hostess.

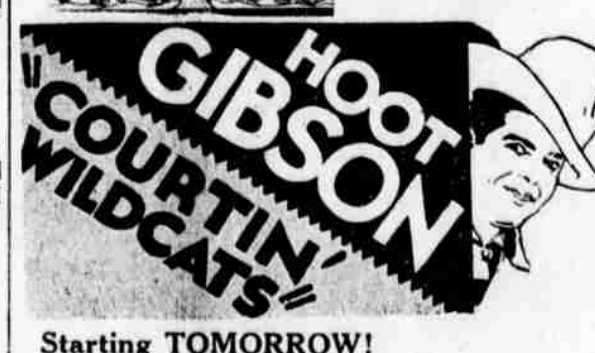
Medford Visitors—

Five White House Widows Now

Mrs. Taft Joins Wives of Wilson, Roosevelt, Cleveland, Harrison



WASHINGTON, March 31.—The recent death of William Howard Taft adds a fifth name to the nation's list of widows of former presidents. Mrs. Taft, now 68, is still remembered as the hostess at the silver wedding anniversary celebration at the White House in 1911, when she and Mr. Taft entertained 5000 persons at a garden party. Her four years there, from 1909 to 1913, were replete with many brilliant events, as the Tafts were famous as entertainers. In the romantic age of the late 80's Frances Folsom, 22, and President Cleveland, 49, were married at the White House. The president's girl wife proved equal to the occasion during the four years she reigned as First Lady, from 1893 to 1897. Her daughter, now Mrs. Randolph West, was the first White House baby. Four years after her husband's death in 1903, Mrs. Cleveland married Professor Thomas J. Preston, of Wells college in New York state. She is now 66. Mrs. Woodrow Wilson came to the White House in 1915 as the war president's second wife. During the trying years that followed, she was his close companion. She went to Europe with him to attend the peace conference at the close of the war. Since Mr. Wilson's death in 1914, she has continued to maintain the famous 8 street home in Washington, occasionally going to Geneva to watch operations of the League of Nations. She returned recently from a trip to the Orient. She is now 67. Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., retired to Oyster Bay, N. Y., after the death of her husband in 1919. At 68, she lives quietly, travels much, avoids publicity. The fifth widow is Mrs. Benjamin Harrison, now 71. She married Mr. Harrison after he retired from the presidency. Nevertheless, she had her share of White House life, as she was a niece of the first Mrs. Harrison. Mrs. Roosevelt is the only one of the widows who receives the government pension of \$5000 a year. Mrs. Wilson declined it. Mrs. Cleveland's second marriage ended her pension; Mrs. Harrison was not entitled to one, and Mrs. Taft's pension has not yet been considered.

Municipal Power Plants Decreasing

More municipal power plants have gone out of business in the last year than came into business in the preceding eight. "The Business Week" notes. This is from a preliminary report by Professor Herbert B. Dorau, of Northwestern University's School of Commerce on a survey of changes in the character and extent of municipal ownership in the American electric light and power industry. At the close of 1922, birth-year of the industry, there were four municipally owned electric plants in this country. Their number steadily increased, to the highest point, 3,066 in 1923, then dropping sharply to 2,320 in 1927. The semi-annual supplement to "Government Ownership and Operation and the Electric Light and Power Industry" issued by the National Electric Light association amplifies the story by recording 1,440 cities and towns where municipal operation has disappeared. Professor Dorau says an explanation must cover legal, political, technological, and economic factors; also changes in popular feeling about government conduct of essential services.

Chiropractors Give Cause and Correction of Spinal Curvatures

Do you realize the far-reaching effects of a curvature in your spine upon your general bodily health, and do you appreciate the fact that many cases of spinal curvature exist wherein the patient is absolutely ignorant of such condition? These curvatures have their beginning, as a rule in childhood, and steadily progress from a minor degree oftentimes until they make life a burden to the patient. These curvatures are of various forms and produce many abnormal conditions of the trunk, neck and head, which are easily apparent to the experienced chiropractor, and very often even to the layman.

Cause of Curvature

Arriving at a cause for these abnormal conditions, we are readily able to eliminate that cause and relieve the abnormality, providing it has not progressed too far. That is, if the patient is not too old and if the degree of curvature is not so marked that the bony segments of the spine have lost their normal shape and size. The great difficulty in the treatment of these conditions by the average physician is that he attempts mechanically to force the entire curvature back so that the spinal segments are in the median line rather than to determine what the causative factor is and eliminate that. We believe it is conceded by everyone that if the cause of a condition can be eliminated, the expression of that condition must cease. It is for this reason that the chiropractor is essentially concerned in causes rather than effects.

Curvatures Appear Gradually

No curvature appears suddenly. People who suffer severe curvatures can remember back to childhood days when they were not aware of any trouble with the spine. If it occurs in babyhood, the parents would find difficulty in telling just when the curvature began. They do know, however, that the condition progressed from one of minor importance to one wherein the entire contour of the spine was changed and very often the contour of the ribs, the trunk, the pelvis and the neck as well.

In analyzing the situation, we are first impressed with the fact that the spine offers itself as the foundation upon which the ribs are placed. It also offers itself as the attachment for numerous ligaments and muscles of equal number on either side. These pairs of ligaments and muscles extend from the spine in opposite directions. After a curvature is fully developed, it is easy to see that the muscles on one side are contracted and short, while those of the other side are relaxed and elongated. Surely it cannot be possible that the spine, of its own activity, assumed an abnormal position and that the muscles contracted or relaxed, because of that abnormal condition. On the other hand, if an examination is made when a curvature first begins and before it has progressed to any considerable extent it is found that the muscles and ligaments on one side are contracted, continually pulling the vertebrae toward that side, while the muscles of the opposite side do not show the same degree of tension, and hence permit their fellows to produce the curvature.

Muscular Tension

In other words, curvature is not a happenstance, but it is the result of a definite abnormal condition of the muscles and ligaments which are attached to the spine. Everyone knows that normally a muscle possesses a certain degree of tone; thus it is, that normally the muscles on both sides of the spine being of the same tone, pull equally both ways, and as a result the spine remains in the median line. When, however, the set of muscles on one side pulls more strongly than those on the other, a curvature is bound to develop. Now the question arises as to why the muscles on one side are in a state of contraction more pronounced than those on the other. The reason is simple. Every muscle is supplied by nerve fibres which carry to the muscle tissue motor impulses from the brain. Normally, these impulses are barely sufficient to maintain the tone of that muscle which manifests itself as a slight contraction. If anything should occur which should produce an excessive expression of these motor impulses the muscle would be excessively relaxed.

Nerve Involvement

There is only one place where these motor impulses passing from the brain to the muscle may be interfered with and that is at the point where they are given off from the spinal cord between the bony segments of the spinal column. Here, they may be pressed upon, and because of that pressure, their carrying capacity be decreased or increased. Such a condition can only exist when a single vertebra is subluxated (out of its normal position). A vertebra becomes subluxated because of falls, twists or sprains, which force it to assume an abnormal position. The foregoing shows conclusively that the curvatures which mar the appearance and affects the health of so many individuals is primarily the result of an abnormal position assumed by a single vertebra. If the pressure produced by that vertebra is increased, then the motor impulses are again supplied in normal quantity, equally to both sides. As a result, the muscles on both sides are equally balanced, and the curvature is naturally eliminated by the equal tone of these muscles. In those conditions which have existed into the patient is well advanced in years, or in those wherein the curvature is extremely severe, complete relief cannot be afforded, for the reason that the bony segments in these cases have actually changed their shape, and the rebuilding process is an extremely slow one. Furthermore, it is not always advisable to correct these curvatures, because masses of false bones have been formed between the segments of the spine which serve to strengthen these supporting structures by bridging the spaces between them. Whether or not a curvature may be corrected can only be told by a personal examination of your spine by a chiropractor. He can then determine for you whether or not the curvatures can be corrected, and whether or not it would be advisable to do so.

There are many far-reaching effects of curvature which the patient does not realize. When a curvature is produced, all of the spinal segments in that curvature are forced to assume an unnatural position and they are apt to produce pressure upon the nerve trunks, which leave the spine through the small openings between them. These nerve trunks pass to and supply various organs in various parts of the body. The organs affected depend entirely upon what part of the spine is involved by the curvature, and what vertebra in that curvature is producing direct pressure. Therefore, it may be safely said that any organ may be affected and any function be impaired because of the curvatures which exist in the spine. It behooves any person who has a spinal curvature to see a chiropractor and have the condition corrected, if it is logical to do so. Especially is this true of children where they are in the growing stage, and are often assuming an unnatural position in their school seats because of a subluxation which the parent is not aware of.
