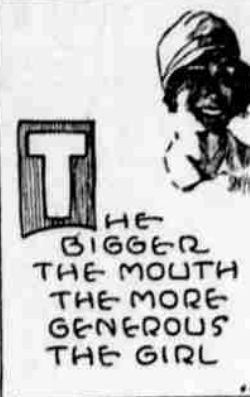
Moodily Improving—

First National Bank Installing New Equipment

Modern new equipment to be used in the First National bank, on which construction will start within the next week or two, is beginning to arrive and part of it is already put into use at the present bank quarters.

Mechanical Changer
A coin distributor, the most marvelous time saver ever invented for banking purposes, works on the same principle as a cream and milk separator. A "scoop shovel" is used to pour the coin into the mouth of the machine, of which a portion re-

veals and drops the coins, separated, into containers. In this way the change is divided into halves, quarters, nickels, pennies and dimes and is accurately counted. The count appears on the face of the machine which tells the amount for each division of coin.

This machine will be moved to the new bank as soon as it is completed and will save hours of time daily and much tedious work counting money.

Teller Has "Changer"
A teller's coin machine which will make any amount of change has also arrived and is now being used at the bank. By using this machine the bank teller can make any amount of change almost instantly. J. A. Gordon demonstrated the new equipment today.

Senate Passes Bill By Oregon Senator

WASHINGTON, April 1. (AP)—The senate today passed a bill granting congressional permission to the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming to negotiate agreements for apportionment of the water supply of the Columbia river and all other streams in which the states are jointly interested. The bill, by Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, now goes to the house.
