Charges Of Irregular Conduct Of Wright Trial Claimed

Object to Premise Inspection

An affidavit, filed by the attorneys for the defense, in support of the motion for a new trial, is based mostly on the inspection of the premises by the jury. It states:

"That upon motion made by counsel for the defendant, the jury which tried the defendant, was permitted by the court to inspect the premises and place where the homicide took place, being in charge of two court bailiffs; besides these two there were present Lloyd Low, sheriff of Klamath county; Keith Ambrose, chief of police of Klamath Falls; Hon. W. M. Duncan, circuit judge; T. R. Gillenwaters, deputy district attorney; C. M. O'Neill, J. C. O'Neill and John Irwin, and that the said Keith Ambrose was appointed by the court to point out the physical features of the place where the homicide took place; and that the defendant, John G. Wright, was not present at such inspection in question, but was in the county jail during the period of time covered by said inspection."

The affidavit further describes the visit of the jurors and officers to the premises and concludes:

"That the members of the jury became so inquisitive and asked so many questions that the court being therewith present had to take the matter in hand and limit the inspection, and the inquiries."

Couzens Opposed To Rail Mergers

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)

A resolution calling upon congress to withdraw from the interstate commerce commission authority to approve railroad consolidations was introduced today by Chairman Couzens of the senate interstate commerce committee.

Couzens' resolution complained particularly of the proposed merger of the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific railroad systems and suggested that congress withhold authority for any consolidation until there is enacted "adequate legislation properly designed to protect and promote the public interest."

March Building Permits Increase

Building permits for the month of March, as shown by the records at the city hall, totalled \$101,176, which was considerably higher than the previous two months.

Fifty-eight building permits for residences were issued and ten commercial permits. The residential permits, amounting to \$95,510, showed the greatest increase. This brings the total number of permits for the year to 154, and the amount to \$269,165. A steady rise is expected from now on, since the spring building program has already commenced.

Most of the aspirants to the major offices, however, have already filed, so it is now possible to give a reasonably clear picture of the line-up.

National Post in Contest

Heading the official list are the candidates for national committeeman of the republican and the democratic parties, the only office to which the primary feature does not apply. The voting for this office results in actual election. Ralph E. Williams, republican national committeeman for many years, will be elected unopposed. But on the democratic side ex-Governor Walter M. Pierce is attempting to unseat ex-Governor Oswald West.

United States Senator McNary is running alone in the republican primary. He will be opposed in November by Elton Watkins, Portland democrat who will file today.

Representative W. C. Hawley of the first district has no contest for the republican nomination. W. A. Delsell of Salem, will be his democratic opponent in November.

Robert R. Butler of The Dalles is unopposed.

Korek Faces Fight

In the third congressional district, Representative Korek must fight for the nomination against L. B. Sandblast and Robert G. Duncan. It is understood that Mr. David T. Honeyman of Portland will today file for the democratic congressional nomination.

On both the republican and the democratic sides the fight for the nomination for governor presents many uncertainties. A. W. Norblad of Astoria, who succeeded the late Governor Patterson, Charles Hall of Marshfield, George W. Joseph of Portland and John A. Jeffrey of Portland have filed. Harry L. Corbett and J. E. Bennett of Portland will file today.

Four democratic candidates are in the field for governor. Senator Edward F. Baile of Junction City, A. C. Hough of Grants Pass, George R. Wilbur of Hood River and Ed. S. Piper of Portland.

Rivalry Among Judges

Judge James U. Campbell of Oregon City and George S. Shepherd of Portland, republicans, are contesting for the right to oppose Justice O. P. Coshaw of the supreme court in November. Justice Harry H. Belt is unopposed for position No. 6.

State School Superintendent C. A. Howard and Labor Commissioner C. H. Gram, both republicans, are unopposed.

Asked at his press conference today whether he or Mrs. Hoover would provide the information, the chief executive replied:
