

GOLF HOUSE OF ROBERT JONES BACK IN ORDER

Amateur Averages Recent Defeat at Hands of Horton Smith

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 2, (AP)—The golfing house of Robert Jones was back in order today. The Atlanta amateur and national open champion shot sub-par golf yesterday to win the South-eastern open tournament here with a total of 284. Thirteen strokes better than the field and his closest rival, Horton Smith, professional.

Smith Gets Money
Jones averaged a recent defeat at the hands of Smith, but the professional, as second man in the tournament, gained the \$1,000 cash first prize.

Not so long ago Bobby and Horton met for the first time at the open tournament in Savannah. The amateur and the pro fought almost to a standstill, Bobby finally going under by one stroke.

Bobby yesterday got another chance at Smith, and he was more than equal to the occasion. He was effective in the superlative degree.

Last night Bobby packed his golf clubs for the last time in competitive golf until he returns from England.

Nears Record
After two rounds of 72 Jones came within one stroke of equaling the course record in the third round, when he turned in a 69, two under par. He shot par 71 in the final 18 holes.

Ed Dudley, Wilmington, Del., pro, won second cash prize of \$750, by taking an aggregate of 288 for the 72 holes. Smith's total was 297. Next came Joe Turnesa of Elmford, N. Y., and Whiffy Cox of Brooklyn, another money player, tied with 299's. Each got \$550. Johnny Farrell of Marmaroneck, N. Y., and Tom Kerrigan of Siwanoy, N. Y., tied at 300, and each got \$350. Frank Walsh, registering from Chicago, had 301, and was paid \$250 for it. Lighthorse Harry Cooper, who has no golfing home, needed 302, and enhanced his golf money pocketbook by \$200.

Cripple Chosen As Gym Captain

A victim of infantile paralysis, Claggett is forced to use crutches to get around. BRAVES HOLD GRAPE-FRUIT CHAMPIONSHIP

Lead National League in Inter-League Spring Series

NEW YORK, April 2, (AP)—With the Boston Braves, perennial holders of the Grape Fruit league championship, showing the way, representatives of the National league have taken a comfortable lead over their rivals from the American in inter-league encounters this spring.

Pifty games involving teams from each major league have been played, and 27 of them have gone to National league clubs. The American has won 22, and one was tied.

Braves Win Ten
The Braves have accounted for ten of the National League's victories, five over the New York Yankees and five over the World's champion Philadelphia Athletics. Brooklyn and Cincinnati are only other clubs with better than an even break against teams from the rival circuit.

Cleveland and Detroit are the only American league clubs with better than a 500 percentage in inter-league warfare. The Indians beat the New York Giants in their only start against a major league club, while Detroit has won five and lost four.

New Orleans Likes Giant Outfielder

NEW ORLEANS, April 2, (AP)—If the New York Giants stay here much longer, they'll lose the services of Mel Ott, the one-time boy wonder, who clouts them far and often. New Orleans is Ott's native city, and apparently he could be elected mayor without making a speech. Everywhere the Giants go Ott is pointed out, the hero of the hour. And the city has taken to Manager John McGraw as well, ever since he declared Ott to be "a phenomenal outfielder and the greatest natural hitter in the business."

Aged Coach Ready For 39th Season

CHICAGO, April 2, (AP)—Nearing his 65th birthday, Amos Alonzo Stagg, tomorrow will go to work on his thirty-ninth University of Chicago football team, in spring practice.

His task is a huge one, the Maroon line regulars having been graduated, and most of the outstanding backs have gone the same way.

Charles Moore High Over All in Registered Shoot Here

S. G. Mendenhall, Medford, won the class A trophy Sunday after tying with W. E. Lamm, Modoc Point, at 96, in the national amateur registered trapshoot tournament held at the Klamath Gun Club grounds.

It took 75 shots to decide the winner, with Mendenhall shooting a 24 and Lamm a 23 on the last five targets.

Charles L. Moore, Klamath Falls, who performed in championship style, took 49 out of a possible 60. He was awarded the trophy for "high over all" with 167 out of 174.

Victor Plath, Bend, won the class C trophy with 97 out of 100 and also won the trophy awarded to the highest scoring visitor. G. Stokes, Bend, won the visitor's trophy with a 46 out of 50.

To M. L. Gilbreath, Lakeview, went the trophy for the doubles winner when he shot a 22 out of possible 24 breaks.

Everett Hardenbrook, Klamath's crack shot, made the longest run of the day, breaking 84 in succession.
