Oregon's Share of Federal Aid Road Fund Much Larger

SALEM, April 2. (AP)—Under the increased federal appropriation for the benefit of federal-aided highways in the states, Oregon will receive, beginning this year, \$800,000 more annually than it has received before, according to Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer. The apportionment of federal money to the states is contingent upon the states matching the government money to the extent of 40 per cent.

Fund Now \$2,000,000
For some years the total federal appropriation has been \$750,000,000, of which Oregon received \$1,200,000. The federal appropriation is now increased to \$1,250,000,000, of which Oregon will receive \$2,000,000.

Klein said that it is impossible to say how the money will be apportioned as to Oregon localities. It will be the policy of the highway commission, he said, to spend the money on those projects that will best advance the state highway program. He said that a large share will be applied to the Roosevelt coast highway, but he was unable to say what per cent.

Portland Voter Files Test Suit On Eddy Measure

SALEM, Ore., April 2. (AP)—A suit to test the constitutionality of the Eddy act which requires that only taxpayers may vote on measures involving bond issues or tax levies was begun in the supreme court yesterday through an original proceeding in mandamus. The plaintiff is Kelley Lee of Portland, represented by Joseph K. Carson as his attorney, and the defendant is election board No. 23 of Multnomah county.

Contents Voting Right

The plaintiff contends that the initiative and referendum give to all legal voters the right to vote on any question regardless of whether it involves the raising of money.

An order was signed by Chief Justice Coshaw setting Tuesday, April 8, as the date for argument.

The case arises in connection with a question to be submitted to the voters of Multnomah county May 16 whether \$5,000,000 in bonds shall be authorized to build a bridge across the Willamette river in Portland.

Time Extended For Filing of Excise Reports

SALEM, Ore., April 2. (AP)—The state tax commission agreed late yesterday to extend to Saturday, April 5, the period for filing returns under the state excise tax act. The period was to have closed Monday night. The commission stated that

some taxpayers have delayed their returns because of a report that a 10-day extension had been or would be granted. No such extension has been contemplated. It was said, and penalty and interest will be imposed after next Saturday.

May Bring \$750,000

"Receipts from the excise tax turned over to the state treasurer to date, including second-half payments, amount to \$450,000," said a statement by the commission, "and it is estimated that the total receipts will be \$750,000. This is about \$200,000 more than was estimated by the commission when it made the recent million-dollar reduction in the state tax levy on property because of anticipated returns from the excise and intangibles taxes."

Legislators Remit Conscience Money

SALEM, April 2. (AP)—The state "conscience fund" was increased yesterday by \$513,70. The contributors were Senator Clarence Butt of Newberg and Representative Wilbur Henderson of Portland, who paid \$275.70 and \$238 respectively.

The conscience fund is being built up by refunds from members of the 1927 legislature who accepted the \$5-per-day expense money provided them by resolution. They were under no legal obligation to repay the money, but since the supreme court has held a similar act of the 1929 session unconstitutional, several members of the 1927 session have returned the money.

EGG PRODUCING MAKES PROFITS

Cost Research Reveals Varied Results for Poultrymen; Reasons Studied by Students

Some Oregon poultrymen have been making as high as 50 per cent profit above costs in commercial egg production, while others have been losing as much as \$2 per hen each year, according to the final tabulation of results of a three-year cost of production survey made by the poultry and farm management departments of the Oregon State college experiment station.

A preliminary report covering the entire three years of cost research has been issued, and a more complete bulletin, giving more detail on the many factors found to affect cost, will be issued later.

Statewide Study Made

On the 154 farms studied, scattered throughout the state, the average cost of producing eggs for the three years, 1926-28, was 28.7 cents. The actual average price received by growers for the same period was 28.1 cents. This applied to nearly four million eggs, making this study one of the most complete of its kind ever carried on.

"On the basis of these averages, the business as a whole paid back to the producers all cash costs, all depreciation, good farm wages for operator and his family for time expended, a profit of 5 per cent interest on investment, and a clear profit of .6 cents a dozen above all," the report points out. "That the business of producing commercial eggs in Oregon is, as a whole, a profitable business, cannot be questioned."

of the vital factors affecting costs is shown by the fact that flocks that fell below an average of 140 eggs per hen showed a net cost per dozen eggs of 34.5 cents, while those of 200 or more average showed a net cost of 25.5 cents. The preliminary report is an 18-page mimeographed publication which contains many tables of cost data and conclusions of the research men as to factors that make for success in the industry. It will be sent free by the college to anyone requesting it.
