TESTIMONY OF WITNESS MAY HELP SLAYER

Frank Henry Says King Not Alone on Night Of Killing

EUREKA, Calif., April 3. (AP)—District Attorney Stephen E. Metzler today was proceeding on the theory that several persons may have been involved in a plot to murder Mrs. Minnie McCoy, whose body was found in the woods 60 miles north of here more than a week ago.

Witnesses Saw Others

Two developments in the case yesterday strengthened this theory, Metzler said. One was an account furnished by Frank Henry of Klamath, Calif., who said that on the night of February 29, when Mrs. McCoy was slain, he saw, standing by the highway at the scene of the killing, the automobile which the young woman had been using. He said he also saw a man bending over some object on the ground, and a little further on, another automobile, parked, and containing two men. The second development was the arrest here of Janice Nelson of Eureka, who was taken into custody after she is alleged to have verbally warned William Martell, local automobile dealer and state's witness in the investigation, to "be careful." The woman was technically charged with disturbing the peace.

Received Surly Answer

Henry told the district attorney that he stopped, out of curiosity, beside the machine containing the two men, and asked them what they were doing at the side of the highway late at night. His answer, he said, was a surly "none of your business."

Clarence L. King, former friend of the slain woman, held here without bail on a murder charge, continued to assert the shooting was accidental. King's bride, Eunice Pardee King, who was detained as a material witness, was released yesterday and has returned to her home near Corvallis, Ore.

Frau's Funeral Solemn Ceremony

BAYREUTH, Bavaria, April 3. (AP)—A solemn funeral ceremony for Frau Cosima Wagner, widow of the great composer, was held in the music room in the Villa Wahnfried today. It was attended by nearest relatives and friends.

The coffin, covered with white roses with Richard Wagner's picture at the head, was carried by an honor guard of police.

At this meeting sportsmen from all over the state will present problems to the commission for discussion, and the matter of resignation will be taken up.

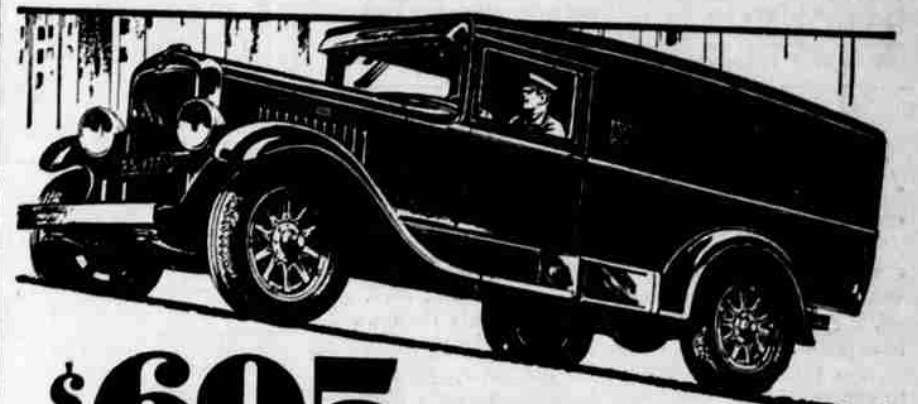
PULLMAN RATE LOWER
