FIRST ANNUAL OPENING MARKS SPRING DEBUT

Latest Attire Displayed Attractively by Many City Stores

And when the curtains parted, to what scenes met the gaze! For the latest in spring frocks and suits and coats, not to mention hats, footwear and other accessories for milady and gentleman, filled the windows along Main street last night at the first annual formal spring opening.

Since spring and Easter displays are always major events to the women, stores catering to this trade will be dealt with first.

In Spring Mode

The Golden Rule, which celebrated its 20th anniversary week played natty spring suits and in addition to the opening decoats in addition to frocks, not forgetting to mention the dainty dresses of pastel shades for the little misses, which filled one window. Baskets of daffodils, snapdragons and carnations provided a season's touch. Some of the spring shoes shown with the various costumes were particularly enticing.

Several blocks west of Klamath's largest department store, two windows which fairly glowed yet whose colorings were appropriately spring's, attracted the passers-by. La Pointe's effectively used rich drapes of gold and deep rose hues as a background for the display of gorgeous lace and georgette frocks which are the last word for formal occasions. And for each dainty gown was a lace hat.

Palm Beach Portrayed
Baskets of flowers and fern offset the display, while within the store could be seen other coats and formal gowns, equally as lovely, and vases of apple and cherry blossoms which somehow have a call of spring all their own.

Across the street, at Moe's some of the vivid and unusual colors being stressed this season shown forth in sport dresses, afternoon frocks, coats and suits.

A display which rivaled all others depicted a Palm Beach scene, with sand and palms. Oratory Contest Is To Be Held Friday

Proposal From Local Chamber Considered
