

# PAVING WAR IS PROBLEM FOR CITY ATTORNEY

## Matter Is Discussed At Council Meeting Last Night

PAVING 36 inside of a small paving war which involves several city streets and property holders on each side has developed, and whether or not several will be forced to install improvements against their wishes now awaits the decision of the city attorney.

Although a petition was presented asking for improvements on Cedar, High and Juniper streets, a second petition signed by some property holders who had signed the first was presented at the last council meeting, requesting postponement of the paving, with the result that the whole matter was set aside indefinitely.

**Murray Sends Letter**

Last night a letter was read from E. J. Murray who is a heavy property holder in this section, in which he pointed out that the council could not set aside the petition on its own whim, but must have the consent of over half the property holders. He called the unpaved and unpaved condition of these streets "a disgrace to property holders of this section."

H. C. Merryman, who acted as spokesman for several of the owners, stated that at one time he had agreed not to oppose the improvement, but he did not want to see it started this year when a number could not afford it.

Mayor Waters said the council started out this year with the policy not to do any unnecessary paving on account of the heavy bonded indebtedness of the city, and as far as the council is concerned, the paving would not be forced this year. The matter was referred to the street committee and city attorney.

**To Establish Grades**

Upon the request of Mr. Williams, the city engineer was authorized to establish sidewalk grades at the corners of Oregon avenue, Tunnel and Prescott streets.

**Request Fire Hydrants**

A request from Keith Ambrose, fire chief, asking for the installation of fire hydrants at the corners of Kiln street and Oregon avenue, Lowell and Oregon, and Angle and Nevada streets was referred to the fire committee.

**May Eliminate "Jungles"**

Believing the elimination of V-shaped signboards located south of the Sixth street viaduct would do away with the hobo hang-out in this section near the railroad, Chief Ambrose asked the council to send a letter to Foster-Kleiser at Medford with a request to remove the signboards. Councilman Olds stated he believed he could handle the matter satisfactorily. Ambrose further stated if the council would refuse to allow wood and other trash to be dumped and burned in the flats it would do away with much of the horse and wagon traffic over the viaduct.

**Asks Pool Hall Permit**

An application from Chris Blanas to operate a pool hall in the basement of the Arcade hotel was referred to the police committee. Blanas contends, in the face of the council's not allowing any more such businesses in the city at the present time, that this would simply be a renewal of an old license.

**Petitions Presented**

A petition signed by 23 property holders asked that sections of Manzanita, Fremont, Eldorado, Dolores and LeRoy streets be paved this year. It was referred to the street committee. Thirteen property holders petitioned the

council for the installation of a light at the corner of Manzanita and Eldorado streets. This was referred to the light committee.

A resolution enforcing the construction of paved sidewalks in several sections of the city was passed by the council. The walks must be constructed this spring.

**Plans Presented**

Plans and specifications for sewer unit 15 which includes West Klamath and Riverside additions, were presented last night for the council's approval.

Following the reading of a letter from J. Percy Wells and the city school board, the city engineer was authorized to estimate the cost of construction of a foot-crossing on the north side of Link river bridge. Wells stated a crossing was badly needed on that side of the bridge, due to the large number of school children living on the north side of town who must cross the river.

The matter of city census-taking was again discussed and it was agreed that with co-operation between the council and chamber of commerce, an accurate count of the city's population would be practically assured. Each councilman will appoint a person in each precinct to check on the census.

The street commissioner was authorized to patch several bad holes which now exist on Main street.

**Roller Skating**

In behalf of the Klamath Merchants bureau, Earl Reynolds, secretary of the chamber of commerce, asked the council to consider adoption of an ordinance which would prohibit roller skating in the business section and on the main highways. The city attorney was authorized to draw up the ordinance.

Forty-five building permits, aggregating \$71,945, were allowed.

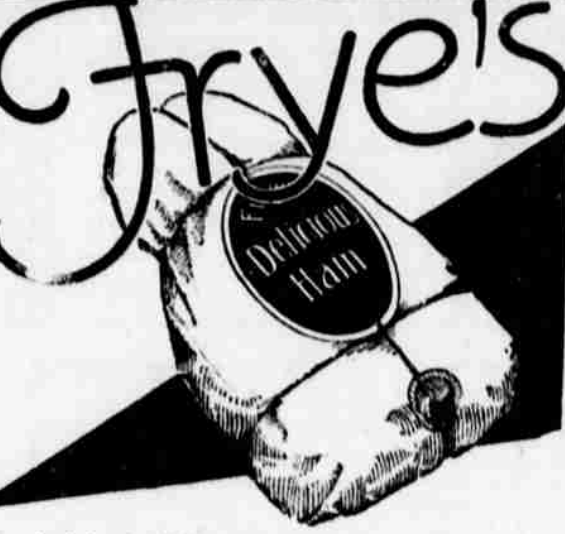
