UPSETS MARK OPENING DAY IN COAST BALL

Seattle Trounces Seals
And Senators Humble
Frisco Missions

SAN FRANCISCO, April 9. (A P.)—Welcomed back by 45,000 followers, Pacific Coast league baseball and its cohorts settled down today for the long six months grind that will lead to the 1930 championship.

The 25th grand opening of the big class AA circuit took place to the accompaniment of a barrage of baseballs; much pomp and ceremony; perfect weather, and two upsets.

Indians Upset Seals
Around 15,000 persons thronged Recreation Park in San Francisco to see the favored Seals go down to a 11-10 defeat in a twelve-inning battle with Seattle's Indians. The lowly rated Seattle bunch held a 9-2 lead until the last half of the 9th when the Seals tied the count with a seven-run rally that saw three pitchers chased to the showers.

In the other unexpected reversal, Sacramento's Senators acted the part of impolite hosts by walloping the San Francisco Missions, 21-14. The Missions used four hurlers while Ed Bryan held down the mound alone for Sacramento. The capitol city crowd was around 10,000.

Angel-Duck Score Close
Clyde Barfoot, right handed finger for Los Angeles, pitched the Angels to a 3-2 win over the visiting Portland team. Barfoot allowed four hits, while Carl Mays, submarine twirler formerly with the New York Giants, was nipped for nine safeties by the Angels. The turnout of 10,000 persons was several thousand less than expected.

penant winners, came to Oakland and demonstrated to 13,000 spectators that they will be a tough team to push around this season. They defeated the Oakland Oaks, 4-1.

LENHART STOPS GEORGE WARNER IN SIXTH ROUND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 9. (A P.)—Fred Lenhart, Spokane, light heavyweight, stopped George (Wyoming) Warner, Cheyenne, in the sixth of their ten-round match here last night. A smashing left hook to the jaw, followed by a right to the face as Warner bounced off the ropes did the business. Warner had made a good showing up to this time, but Lenhart's ruggedness and advantage in weight told against him. The six-round semi-final between Tom Morgan, Dublin, and Jack Baker, St. Paul ended in a technical knockout when Referee Loutitt stopped it in the fourth to save Baker from further punishment. Baker started well and landed some effective straight rights, but Morgan's boxing ability gave him a big advantage.

Fred Gallas, Vancouver, put Terry Kileen, Independence, out in the third round. Kileen was in great pain and it was said he suffered two broken ribs. Jack Hall, decisioned Johnny Topas and Joe Dagutis scored an easy victory over George Lastmaris.

Carnera Boomed by Los Angeles Fans

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 9. (A P.)—Primo Carnera, Italian giant heavyweight, chalked up his fourteenth consecutive victory in the United States here last night when he knocked out Neil Clisby, Riverside negro in the second round. Carnera finished his man with a hefty right to the jaw which lifted the negro off his feet. The blow was the first straight punch the Italian had landed, with the exception of a swinging left hook in the first round that struck the negro on the neck and sent him down for a no-count. Carnera's exhibition greatly pleased the 12,000 spectators who paid \$40,000 to see him, and he was booed and hissed as he left the ring. Clisby spent most of his time ducking and clinching, although he sank a couple of blows to the Italian's stomach.
