The Decline In Cursing

SIGNS are not altogether wanting that this is a weak and flaccid age. There is, for instance, the matter of cursing.

In a recent romantic-adventure novel dealing with fightings and roisterings of the 17th century, the author tells how a certain dour Scotsman was thrown into jail for some breach of the peace. Locked in his cell, this Scotsman stood up, looked about him and began to curse.

Now the novelist takes up more than half a page telling how the prisoner cursed. He tells how he cursed his jailers, the police who had arrested him, the witnesses who had complained against him; how he cursed, methodically and in order, their ancestors, singly and collectively; how he extended his range, then, and began cursing the whole ruling class of Scotland from the lowest bailiff to the high lords of parliament; and now, at the end, he went back to the beginning, to be sure he had missed no one, and devoted a final five minutes or so to a recapitulation of all his former curses.

All in all, the novelist makes it clear that this man spent a good half hour in energetic, prayerful cursing. When he had finished, of course, he felt a great deal better, and was doubtless somewhat exhausted.

But the present, we regret, is a supine age. Is there, in all the land today, one man who could curse steadily, and effectively, for half an hour? Not one. The most violent of army top- sergeants cannot maintain a flow of language for so much as five minutes without getting confused, repeating himself and trailing off into meaningless oburgations.

There is in this writer's memory a poignant memory of an apt illustration of this decline. During the war there was a chief petty officer in the navy who was exceedingly profane. His flow of language was a marvel and an inspiration to his subordinates. One day, at an inspection, a lieutenant took this chief petty officer to task for some trifling error and made a particular idiot of himself in the way he called attention to the lapse. The chief petty officer, reddening, took it in silence; and when the lieutenant left the sailors who were nearby prepared to hear some rock-shivering blast of cursing that would eclipse anything they had ever heard before.

The chief petty officer drew in his breath for the great effort; then suddenly he deflated himself. His shoulders drooped wearily, and in a weak voice he remarked simply, "Ain't he foolish?"

The man simply wasn't up to it. He couldn't do the situation justice. Where a sailor of 200 years ago would have orated for five minutes, he found he had no vocabulary or training to deal with the matter.

We have declined. We aren't the men our forefathers were. We spend our energy on pointless cursing over trivialities; when the big events, that deserve real, expert, two-fisted cursing arise, we are helpless.

EDITORIALS FROM OVER THE NATION

NO TRUE REPUBLICS THOSE
Albert Bushnell Hart in Current History: Ever since the World war, which closed eleven years ago, a great effort has been made by Latin America, by European nations and by the people of the United States to play up the Latin Americans.

Those three groups all insist that the twenty sister republics are full and equal members of the family of nations. The Latin American powers that desire it, as most of them do, send delegates to the League of Nations, who are placed on important committees, participate in the discussion of world affairs, and vote upon questions of great importance to the world.

Much is made of the influence on the world of these republics, quite overlooking the trifle that not one of them had a republican government in the American sense of the word. Perhaps that is reasonable in the assembly of the league, a body that receives from the people of Poland, of Italy, of Spain and of Yugoslavia delegates designated and directed by the dictators of those countries.

The American people, as well as Europeans, are given a false perspective by the failure or neglect to observe that not a single Latin American republic possesses a government which is based upon regular, open and uncontrolled elections by those who have the legal suffrage in these countries. Not a single one of these Latin American states has passed through the last fifty years without a violent revolution, ending in a despotism.

Chile a few decades ago was considered an example of wise and temperate government by persons selected out of a ruling class; then suddenly another set

of persons out of the ruling class took it upon themselves to suspend the existing Chilean government by exiling the officials.

MAN AND HIS POWER

Western Way in News: Far out in a little western lumber camp comes this story:

Three brothers, powerful men, and very much attached to one another, worked as lumbermen. No place for weakness! One day, as the story goes, the eldest brother was caught beneath a rolling log. It was a large one and beyond the power of any two ordinary men to lift. Fortunately, the other two brothers were nearby and saw the predicament of their elder brother. They did not! They leaped to the log and lifted it completely off the injured man, thus saving his life.

The next day the same two valiant brothers came back with two friends. They tried to move the log again, but the united power of four brawny men could not budge it one inch! What is it that gives men this vast superpower in times of emergency? Unused energy, men never knew they had, that leaps into readiness to meet exigencies? You have seen the pursued swifter than the pursuer. You have heard of colossal tasks, seemingly impossible under ordinary conditions, being performed by men and women under the stern whiplash of necessity. Man's accomplishments are limited only to the power of his mind and will. And he never knows what, and how much, he can do until he really tries. The lumber story moral is obvious.

DAILY LETTER ON AFFAIRS AT U. S. CAPITAL

Why Not Name the New Planet "New America"? So That Folks Made Destitute by the Tariff Will Have a Place to Colonize?—So Asks Senator J. Boomboom McWhorter.

WASHINGTON, April 10—

Senator J. Boomboom McWhorter observes that the astronomers are trying to find a name for the newly discovered planet and asserts that there ought not to be any trouble. A planet which was threatened with the name Percival, as this one was, will be thankful for anything else it gets, in the senator's opinion.

McWhorter became interested in the new planet when someone told him that it probably would try to sell goods in the United States and that he ought to find out just what its exports were so he could be sure to get a duty on them in the new tariff bill. Although he discovered that the planet had no known export trade, he has since maintained an academic interest because, as he foresightedly explains, there's no telling when we will have to send an expedition of marines there to protect American life and property.

Planet as An Issue
"After considerable research and several consultations with the experts at the Naval Observatory," says Senator McWhorter, "I have come to the conclusion that the main difficulty about naming this planet is the fact that there are so many possible names that it is applied and only one planet."

"Facing such a situation, Congress, in its wisdom, should undoubtedly act. There are nearly 500 members running for reelection this year and most of them wish they had an issue which they could discuss both bravely and intelligently. I do not think there is one voter in a thousand who cares whether this planet is called Percival, Gogmagog, Uneeda Rest, Hoopoe, Claudius Huston or Dewdrop Inn. What a marvelous issue for campaign speeches! I know a dozen senators who were going to campaign solely against the World Court but who have been discovering that there is some interest in this matter among their constituents and have had to give up the idea entirely. We might call this planet 'Eureka' because so many of us have now found our burning issue!"

"But let's be as patriotic about this thing as we can. It has always been a matter of great pain to me that the planets have foreign names and mostly Italian names, too. I myself probably will put in a bill to name this planet 'New America,' which is an especially good idea for colonization purposes. After the new tariff act becomes a law there will be a whole lot of unemployed people who won't be able to afford to live in our glorious country any more and there will have to be some place for them to go. Some other candidate for reelection probably can get considerable support by proposing to name it after Lindbergh's baby—as soon as we find out what the name is going to be."

Parley Tricks

The senator expressed utmost satisfaction with the progress of the London naval conference. "Each day it looks more and more like we were going to have the biggest and best navy in our history," he commented. "The strategy of our representatives at London has been of the castiest in all our diplomacy. It appears that they realized at the outset that the only way to establish unquestioned American naval superiority was to set the building figures so high that neither England or any other nation would ever have the money to build up to them. Our talk about reduction fooled all the other nations and they opposed it just to be contrary. We need a bigger army, too. Let's have a conference to reduce the world's military forces."

"I see where Mr. Kellogg, the ex-secretary of state, says that 'something will come out of the London conference.' I suppose he means the delegates!"

EIGHTEEN YEARS AGO IN KLAMATH

After considerable discussion by the city council at their last meeting, the proposition to put fire hydrants at four points, as recommended by the fire committee, through Allen Sansbie, was stalled.

There is a heavy movement of lumber workers, especially going into the woods on the season's cut. The boats are running every day except Sunday, one boat handling the traffic from this end of the lake, and the other plying between the Upper Lake points, making its headquarters at Eagle Ridge.

It has been decided by the city school board to take a vote on the subject of acquiring a site for a school which it is proposed to build between the Central school and Shippington. Most of the proposed site, will be donated by the Klamath Development company.
