Gas Bootleggers Operating Along Lower Columbia

SALEM, Ore., April 19, (AP)—Reports that gasoline "bootleggers" are operating along the lower Columbia river and deriving big profits by evading the motor vehicle fuel tax laws of both Oregon and Washington are being investigated by Oregon officials. Secretary of State Hoss said today.

While the department finds it necessary to guard continuously against similar operations along state borders the alleged major violations on the lower Columbia are said to have developed since completion of the Longview bridge.

Evade Both State Laws.
It is said to be the practice of the violators to get the gasoline in large tanks or drums on the Washington side of the river and convey it to their pumps on the Oregon side. Since this operation is considered as transportation from Washington they evade the tax in that state. They evade it a second time on the Oregon side by failing to qualify as gasoline dealers or distributors.

MARKET QUOTATIONS

PORTLAND, April 19, (AP)—Egg and butter quotations still showed no change today, despite accumulating supplies. Both products have an unusually weak undertone.

Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland bureau of the United States department of agriculture says:

"The Portland asparagus market weakened considerably this morning, under heavy receipts of California stock. Some 15 cars of California 'grass' is on track, and sales were made at 5 to 7 cents per lb., with only an occasional high-quality lot realizing 1 or 2 cents higher. Receipts of Oregon and Washington asparagus totalled about 200 30-lb. crates, and prices for this fine-quality product dropped 25 cents to \$1.40-1.50 per dozen one-lb. bunches. Early movement was good, but later trading was draggy, even at the lower quotation.

Although California asparagus shipments are still heavy, low prices and canners' increased demand are expected to cause lighter movement soon.

"Lettuce shows a wide range in quality, from 35 cents to \$4.50 with most sales of good quality Arizona and central California stock at \$3-3.50.

"Tomatoes display a similar wide range. Although ripe, packed stock sells to retailers at about \$4 per 30-lb. lug, many original packs are sold to jobbers, large retailers, and fruit stands at \$1.50-2.50 per lug. Rather heavy shrinkage occurs in some lots.

"Increasing movement of Bermuda onions from Texas (40 cars yesterday) is expected to curtail eastern inquiry for Oregon onions which was quite active earlier in the week. Shipping point sales advance somewhat, to a high of \$1.25 per cwt., plus bags, for best stock, to growers.

"Rhubarb was barely steady at 1/2-cent per pound, with liberal receipts."

PORTLAND, April 19, (AP)—CATTLE AND CALVES: Looks about steady; receipts cattle 209, including 25 through.

HOGS: Quotably steady for slaughter classes, around 50c lower for feeder pigs. Feeder
