HUSKIES MAKE CLEAN SWEEP IN OAR RACES

Superhuman Drive By Varsity Crew Spoils Day for Bears

SEATTLE, April 12, (AP)—A resounding challenge was hurled at the prospective participants in the coming National Poughkeepsie Regatta from the wind-lashed waters of Lake Washington here yesterday when the University of Washington Huskies scored a clean sweep in the three races of the annual California - Washington crew event.

90,000 Saw Races
A crowd estimated at nearly 90,000 persons witnessed probably the most thrilling crew race of their lives when the Northern Huskies, in a sleek, cream colored sport model shell which was named the "Pay Streak," just a day before the big event, nosed out the California Bears by five feet in a last minute superhuman drive. It was a heart-breaking race for the Californians as they had held the upper hand all the way down the long three mile course until the final 300 yard spurt of the Washington veterans.

Minor Events Easy
Although wholly unexpected

the Huskies easily carried off the Junior Varsity and Freshman races. The Washington Jayvees eight trimmed the Bear second boat by nine and one quarter lengths and the Husky Yearlings trounced the California Cubs by seven and one half lengths. The Junior Varsity race was over the three mile course and the Freshman two on account of a strong head wind resulting times were very slow compared with the Lake Washington records. The Washington Varsity sailed through the choppy water in 17 minutes 46 seconds compared with the record of 15:58 established in 1915. California covered the distance in only one fifth of a second slower. Washington's Junior Varsity turned the trick in 18:37 and California in 19:14. The Husky Freshman boat was clocked in 12:15.

Bears Set Pace
The blue ribbon event, the Varsity race for Pacific rowing supremacy, was a neck and neck battle from start to finish with the California boat setting the pace. The Bears captured a quarter length lead at the start and held it most of the time. Washington challenged the lead three times when they started to catch the California "Sequoia" but the Bears retaliated with similar drives each time to capture their advantage again.

Husky Spurt Wins
The grueling race was won in the last 300 yards when Washington raised its cadence to 40 strokes per minute to catch the Bear shell at the one hundred mark and then forced into the slight lead which was just enough for victory. California hoisted its pace to 38 nearly a half mile from the finish mark and did not have any more when the famous Bear towel was madly waved by Coxswain Jimmy Logan which was the signal for the big spurt. Try as he did Harvey Granger, California stroke was unable to carry the cadence any higher and the "Pay Streak" slid by to give Washington its first varsity victory in the last four years.

Coast Champions Drub Bostonians

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 12.—Boston Bruins, runners up to Canadiens at Montreal in the recent world's hockey championship play-offs failed to show much of their famed puck wizardry here last night, and as a result dropped a 3 to 1 decision to the Vancouver Lions, Pacific coast league champions. The Lions, strengthened for the contest, the first of a three game post season exhibition series, by the addition of King Clancy and Hec Ketter, two Ottawa national hockey league stars, played dashing hockey throughout to take the verdict.
