CROOKS OBTAIN \$75 BY RUSE

Chief of Police Keith K. Ambrose left last night for Medford on a report that two men wanted here for the robbery of the Pioneer Tobacco company till Thursday were under arrest there.

Thursday, about noon, two men entered the office of the Pioneer Tobacco company. They pretended to be customers. While one man went with the clerk who was alone in the store the other remained in the office.

After the two men had left without buying anything, it was learned that \$75 had been stolen from the till.

The owner of a campground on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway reported that two men had stopped there Thursday afternoon and had attempted to get him to leave the camp ground office on the presumption that they wanted a drink of water. He pointed to a faucet and glass in the yard and told them to help themselves. The descriptions tallied with those of the men who robbed the tobacco company till.

Yesterday two men were reported to have been apprehended in Medford when the proprietor and one of the men returned and caught the other man opening the safe of the store. Chief Ambrose left for the valley to see if it was the same two who robbed the company here.
