ALLAHABAD, Bombay, India, April 14. (AP)—Pundit Jawaharlal Nehru, president of the all-India National congress, was sentenced to six months simple imprisonment this afternoon by a British court after conviction on the charge of violation of the Indian salt laws. He was arrested on this morning.

The trial of the pundit was held in the Central Jail while Indians staged a demonstration in front of the structure. A large crowd gathered waving National flags. Nehru appeared at the window and thanked the demonstrators.

Markets Shut Down. BOMBAY, India, April 14. (AP)—News of the arrest of pundit Jawaharlal Nehru, president of the all-India National congress spread like wildfire through Bombay this morning.
