Sande Trying to Stage Comeback

HAYRE DE GRACE, Md., April 15. (AP)—Earle Sande, for a decade one of the greatest of American jockeys, has begun a comeback that he hopes will again put him at or near the top of the list once more.

Sande, who retired as a jockey to become an owner-trainer at the end of the 1923 season, was assistant Frank Hayes' Rockside yesterday but finished out of the money. The public, rallying to the support of the 32-year-old rider, hastened to plunge on Rockside and the Hayes' entry went to the post a well-backed favorite.

Sande has hopes of realizing his greatest ambition—the riding of 1,000 winners. Over a riding career of 11 years Sande has ridden 942 winners out of a total of 3,532 mounts accepted. All told, Sande's charges earned \$2,642,325 in prize money.

River Searched For Thief's Body

BEND, Ore., April 15 (AP)—The Deschutes river, 20 miles south of Bend, was searched today for the body of the thief who stole an automobile belonging to L. E. Howard, railroad telegrapher, last week.

The machine was raised from the river yesterday but the driver

was not found. Tracks in the mud along the river led officers to believe that the thief went down with the machine or purposely made tracks to elude pursuit.
